
Make your own fun.

Rally – as well as getting together, a Rally goes one step further and includes some organized meals, entertainment and may also include training seminars and other activities. Our Club holds a yearly Spring and Fall Rally which involve a business meeting, and the Fall event is our Annual General Meeting.

Books:

Harvest Hosts:

Harvest Hosts has a network of Hosts primarily across the USA, but they have sites in Canada as well. Membership is \$99.00 USD per year.



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As an alternative, Terego is a Canadian company owned and operated by a mother and daughter passionate about camping and agrotourism. If you are the kind of traveller that likes to venture unknown routes, taking time to meet the locals and marvel at the taste of new delights while experiencing breathtaking landscapes, then this may be for you. Apps:

There are also many travel planning apps available, just find one that works for you. I use the CAA trip planner and Campendium; they're easy to use but you may find something you like better.

Planning:

Once you decide where you want to go and are planning your route, be sure to look for gas stations, places to stop for lunch, interesting sights, tourist attractions and activities.

We try to keep our drive to 4 or 5 hours, broken up into 2 legs. There are times we do a bit less or more, but we always look for convenient places stop so that both Chloe and we can have a break and stretch our legs or have a snack.

Itinerary:

Set up your trip itinerary listing dates, campgrounds, number of nights, contact information and confirmation number. Also include what you'd like to see or experience in the area. I think we've all stayed at a campground we wish we could stay longer and others that we stayed a bit too long; it just happens. Keep copies of your confirmations on your phone, or computer whichever you take with you and print a hard copy of your confirmations and put them chronologically into a binder or folder. I take the confirmation into the office when we arrive at a campground.

Finally, please keep in mind that regardless of where we travel, we will still have Airstream visitors from the south coming into Canada to experience our culture, wonderful hospitality and the beauty that Canada has to offer. Setting all the politics aside, we will continue to be good neighbours and leave the welcome mat out and the porch light on.

Hopefully this helps, happy planning, enjoy the journey.

Region 2 President's Message

As we start the 2025 camping season WBCCI has reached a milestone! The Club is celebrating its 70th year. Founded in 1955, it is the largest and oldest singlebrand RV club in existence.

Wally Byam, inventor of the iconic Airstream travel trailer, had been leading groups of intrepid travelers on international caravans in their beloved Airstream trailers for four years when the idea to incorporate a caravan club was born. On Aug. 3, 1955, during the Eastern Canada Caravan led by Wally's cousin, Helen Byam Schwamborn, travelers gathered in Kentville, Nova Scotia, for the first Wally Byam Caravan Club membership meeting. This marked the beginning of a rich tradition, uniting generations of Airstream enthusiasts in our passion for adventure, camaraderie, and exploration. An oral history project gathering current member stories and recollections about their family's history with the club has begun, with materials gathered to be donated to the soon-to-be established Airstream Club International Historical Center. I'm sending each Club President a list of WBCCI members who have been with the Club 25+ years. My hope is that they reach out to these members and send their recollections, family history and photos to the link below.

In that vein, I did a search of Region 2 members with greater than 25 years and asked their Club presidents to send me a photo and responses to the same questions. I will be including some of these interviews in my President newsletter.

Roy D. is from the New York Finger Lakes Airstream Club with his home base in Webster, New York. Since he lives less than 5 minutes from my house, he was a logical choice for me to stop in and have a chat.

Roy is retired from Eastman Kodak.



He has been Airstreaming since 1988 making him a member of WBCCI for 37 years.

He is on his 3rd Airstream. The first Airstream he used/borrowed was a 25ft. from his parents so Airstreaming is in his blood. He has had 3 different traveling



companions: his wife Louise, Helen Lagasse, and now his daughter Ann.

Roy is a past President of the New York Finger Lakes Unit which was formed in 2003, and is now called the New York Finger Lakes Club. The following Units were combined to create this Unit: Niagara-Genesee, Greater Rochester, Upstate and Susque-Lawrence.

Roy has been on many US-based caravans and hosted multiple rallies in the US and Canada. One of his prized possessions is his 46th International appreciation gift. One of his notable quotes is "I don't know how to travel without my Airstream."

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► What do you store underneath your dinette? His response was that the table is foldable and does not have anything underneath.

► What tools or gadgets have you found to be the most useful for doing on-the-road, DYI repairs? His response was bring everything. Especially Duct Tape!

► What do you seek out and stop for on every Airstream Trip? Watching the scenery and conversation. When I'm driving, I focus on the road.

Roy is noted for his interesting lawn chair. He got the plans from his daughter Nancy's husband and he built one from those plans. He still has the plans if anyone wants to build one.

Wayne and Linda M. joined WBCCI in January 1999 but were asked to be charter members of a new unit, the Washington DC Unit, just before November 1999 and haven't looked back.

► Current Airstream – 1999 (coincidence?) 30' Classic.

► Streaming Since – Our very first outing was Nov 1999 to the first Installation Rally. We had to go without our rig because it wasn't finished yet. Our official first outing with our restored 1966 Tradewind was April 2000 to the WDCU Cherry Blossom Rally in RFK Stadium complete with an armed guard. We also had our Airstreams on the road behind the Capital building with all of us in front of them for a photo op.

► Number of Airstreams owned - We have had many, but we didn't travel in all of them. Once we restored our 1966 Tradewind in 1999 we collected Airstreams from all over. The idea was to restore and sell them, but you can't restore anything if you are working then out rallying all the time. Those were the days you could find them in old

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campgrounds, on property along the highway and found out about others from folks stopping to talk to us and ask us "How do you keep it so shiny?" or "Do they still make those?"

► **Travel Companions** – Just Wayne and I. Kids old enough to stay home alone and no pets. When asked when making reservations if I have any pets my reply is usually, just my husband.

► Home Base – Wayne and I were born in New England both from Massachusetts and then moved to southern NH when we were young. In 2024 we sold our house in NH and moved to SC not far south of Greenville. There is no snow here!

► Why did you decide to purchase an **Airstream?** – That's a funny story. We brought our kids up tenting and shortly after a pop-up camper. The pop-up had reached the end of its life cycle and I was planning on getting a new tent. Wayne showed me an ad from the newspaper for a 1966 24' Airstream. I gave it back to him without comment and thought, over my dead body! I agreed to go see it choosing my battle. Wayne gabbed all the way, I didn't say a word. A broom handle held the door closed, it was encased in ice and the inside was a disaster with squirrel nests in the drawers. Wayne gabbed all the way home, I didn't say a word. The next morning, I was researching Airstreams and WBCCI. A cup of coffee was placed in my hand, and I said, I don't know why but we have to buy this Airstream. It was flat-bedded home in January 1999 and Wayne started restoring it.

▶ What do you seek out and stop for on every Airstream trip? – While we were both working it was mostly rallies and we would try to go see something. It was always a long drive from NH to the mid-atlantic area the rallies were usually in so I was determined to see and learn something. Since retirement we rally when we can but seek out trips south and west where we have never been before. National Parks, Monuments and Battlefields a must. Gotta collect those stamps! It's the only evidence we have been there!?

► What do you store underneath the dinette and how do you keep things organized? – We don't have a dinette in our 1999 but when we did have a rig with a dinette anything could be found there, ice maker, back packs, computer bags while we were working etc. Organization was always soft bins for the upper lockers with the curve.

What tools or gadgets have you found to be the most useful for doing on-the -road, DIY repairs? - Wayne usually has a few bins of tools in the bed of the truck. Rivet guns, wrenches, aluminum stock etc. I can't talk to tools but the items I make sure we travel with is anything I can use to prepare food on the road. We quickly learned fast food on the road can take the excitement out of you. One of my favorite gadgets is my Hot Logic which is the size of a lunch box that plugs into the truck and heats/cooks like a slow cooker. I won't leave without it. I always have my computer, which is always on my lap while traveling to help me navigate when we are in a traffic slow

down to find alternate routes, finding the next travel stop or fueling station. We recently added a CB radio for traffic issue information, communicating with others we may be traveling with or for serious weather issues.

► How do you pass the time and stay motivated when you face long stretches on the road? – Music, researching the area we are driving through on my laptop then sharing the findings. Wayne does most of the driving, but I share maybe 25%- 30% to be able to give him a break.

I recall telling Wayne, who is the one who signed us up with WBCCI, "Don't be signing us up to any of those blue hair groups!" Well, here we are 26 years later and still members of the WDCU, retired with gray hair. Both of us have participated as Unit Officers, VAC Officers and I am the unit newsletter editor. I hope we can rally and travel for many, many more years! We can't wait to go rallying with our Airstream family!

The largest celebration takes place in August at the Airstream Club International Rally in York, Pennsylvania. Taking advantage of the "Let's Make History" theme of this year's Rally, the club will host activities throughout the week-long rally highlighting the rich history of the club.

Registrations for the Region 2 International Rally Luncheon at York, the Region 2 Rally at the Center County Grange Fairgrounds, and the joint Sampson State Park Rally, are now open. The links are below. There is limited space for seating at the International Luncheon in York so do not delay! Right now, we have 235 rigs signed up for the International. If everyone attends, that works out to approx. 425 people for the Luncheon. Mission BBQ is catering the meal, and we have quite the spread planned!

We are pleased to announce that our 2025 Eastern Ontario Shakedown will take place from Thursday May 8 through Monday May 12, 2025, at the Richmond Fair Ground. This is the weekend before the Victoria Day long weekend and the Spring Rally in Blyth.

As usual, we will have our Thursday trip to the Glen Restaurant at 5:00 p.m. for early arrivals, Friday snack at 7:00 p.m., potpuck meal on Saturday at 5:00 p.m., and a Sunday breakfast, cooked and served by the hosts and volunteers at 8:30 a.m. The hall (Heated, Dry and Bug-Free as needed) will be available to us all weekend for Happy Hours, games, deep technical discussions, and general merriment. The Blyth campground is booked 5 nights starting Thursday, May 15. Nightly camping fees are \$52.38. The camping fee will be automatically calculated for you when you register at https:// airstreamclub.org/2025-spring-rallyregistration and indicate what nights you plan on staying. Campsites have electric (at least 15amp) and water hook-ups. Toilets and showers are close to the camp sites and a dump station is on site.

The rally activities start on Friday and end on Monday after breakfast. Camping is available Thursday to Tuesday. The fees for camping and the rally are separate on the registration. The rally fee will cover:

- ► Breakfast Saturday, Sunday and Monday which offers a variety of fruits, juices, cereals and baked goods, plus of course coffee and tea.

- ► Common costs like printing, table decor and miscellaneous items
- Saturday's evening entertainment, "Frankie and the Fairlanes"
- ► Can-Am is sponsoring the Pizza Party Sunday night

The catered dinner Saturday night is optional and can be selected on the registration form. Before the meal there will be a "Hassle Tassel" – happy hours at host trailers to get acquainted with fellow campers. You'll need your chair, a snack to share and a beverage. We all hope for no rain!

Sunday dinner is a Pizza Party sponsored by Can-Am. Afterwards we will have a game of BINGO with lots of crazy fun!!

Vehicle Discount Program

<u>The Tin Man Needed It</u>

When Dorothy from the Wizard of Oz first met the Tin Man in the woods, he was in desperate need of some lubrication. The Tin Man was caught out in the rain and seized up and he needed Dorothy and the Scarecrow to lubricate his joints to get him going again. What does this have to do with Airstreams? Well Airstreams, too, can get caught out in the rain, from time to time, and parts of the Airstream can seize up. That is why we should lubricate certain parts of the Airstream to keep them working as designed so we can continue like Dorothy on our adventures. I would suggest at least annually if not semiannually depending on the amount of use your Airstream sees.

Now each area that needs lubricating requires a different type of lubricant. I have narrowed down to three I use to cover nine areas of the Airstream that need lubrication. The first is Boshield T9, a lubricant developed by Boeing Corporation for lubricating airplane parts. This lubricant is waterproof with rust and corrosion protection that flushes out old lubricant, displaces water and dries to a waxy film that clings to metal for months. A 1 oz bottle can be purchased from Amazon for \$12.95. A little bit goes a long way.



Areas to lubricate

1. Door Hinges

2. Locks, put some Boshield T9 on the key and run it in and out of the lock to get the pins inside the lock lubricated.

3. The entry step, lubricate all the hinges of the step and you will find it much easier to get those steps up and down. Maybe not easier for you to get up and down, but the steps will fold up and open much better.

4. The window latches can use some lubrication again to help with ease of movement.

Ontario Canada Airstream Club

The second lubricant I use is a silicone spray. I personal like Jig-A-Loo which you can buy at Canadian Tire for \$7.99 a can. This is an oilfree, non-greasy lubricant that waterproofs and protects. No stains, no dripping, no scent. It stops squeaks, un-sticks just about anything, protects against rust and is an exceptional water repellent. Jig-A-Loo is ideal for wood, metal, glass, rubber, leather, fabrics, most plastics.



Areas to lubricate

1. The arms on the manual or power awning. Just spray some silicone spray on the arms where one-part slides into another to help keep them moving freely. Sometimes it is easier to spray the lubricant on an old rag then wipe down the arms.

2. The screw part of your stabilizing jacks. This can be done for either manual or powered jacks. Ensure the screw parts are clean before applying the lubricant.

3. I also use this lubricant for the hitch coupler to keep it freed up.

The third lubricant I use is a spray can of white lithium grease. The 3-In-One Professional White Lithium Grease offers a heat and water-resistant formulation. It sprays on evenly as a liquid and dries to a thick coating, without splattering, melting, running, washing off, or freezing. White lithium grease can be purchased at Canadian Tire for \$13.99.

Areas to grease.

1. If you have a power awning in the top of each arm about halfway down towards the RV when the awning is out there is a small hole which is just slightly larger than the straw from the white lithium grease can. Spray some white lithium grease in this hole to help keep the arm extending mechanism working. I have seen several power awnings where they were not lubricated and ultimately lead to failure.

2. The other place white lithium grease is good for is the ball on your hitch. This helps prevent wear on the ball and becoming sloppy in the connector.

Tabs 4 Kids Wheels - Rick A.

'Tabs 4 Kids Wheels' is an organization whose purpose is to provide wheelchairs for kids who need them both physically and financially. It began in 1992 by a school teacher in southwest Ontario to provide a chair for the caretaker's son. All the teachers and the kids in the school began to collect aluminum tabs to buy a chair for the young boy. Having succeeded in this first venture, they decided to continue with the idea of providing chairs for other needy kids.

Over the years, news spread to other schools and people. Now, many of the schools in the southwest Ontario area are collecting tabs and even using the school transport system to collect from many schools and bring them to the coordinator near Dorchester. Many individuals are collecting from many friends and so the organization grows.

When the tabs arrive at the drop-off farm near Dorchester, they are carefully screened by many volunteers to make sure that there is no unwanted material mixed in with the aluminum tabs. Then the aluminum tabs are taken to a recycler in London and sold. The money is deposited in a bank account and, when enough money has been collected, a chair is bought.

The often-asked question 'How many tabs does it take to buy a chair?' is impossible to answer. Past chairs have cost anywhere from five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to one hundred and thirty thousand dollars (\$130,000) if they are motorized, and the price of aluminum varies a great deal also. The co-ordinator tries to be vigilant and sell the tabs when the price is high so she is more efficient.

'Tabs 4 Kids Wheels' works with the Thames Valley Children's Centre who provide the names of kids who need a chair. What a success story this organization is; starting in 1992 with just a few people in one school to buy one chair, it now involves many schools and very many individuals who collect, transport and sort the tabs with so much success that they have provided more than 60 chairs!!
