

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Greetings Louisiana Airstream Club members and affiliates

I hope everyone is doing well and enjoying our beautiful weather. The pollen is finally gone here in Walker, La. and it is nice.

I want to give a brief history of our Club. I am in no way our Club historian; Dale Spillman, 2nd VP is the expert in this field. Wally Byam Caravan Club International issued the Louisiana Unit a unit Charter on the 26th day of June 1968. We are approaching our 57th anniversary this June. The Wally Byam Caravan Club was chartered in 1955 in Kentville, Nova Scotia Canada. The WBCC was registered in the United States in June of 1957 in the State of Ohio.

The International Club is divided into 12 Regions and we are in Region 6. Alabama, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee, and the panhandle of Florida are the states that comprise Region 6. At one time, Louisiana had five Airstream Clubs. When Rebecca and I joined in 2014, there were three Clubs; Louisiana, Acadiana, and the New Orleans unit. Acadiana merged with us in 2018, and New Orleans dissolved without merging with anyone around the same time.

With all of the different Clubs in our State, there was a lot of interaction and camaraderie with each other. Rally planning and activities were centered around these different Clubs, making it easier to connect with people state-wide. There used to be a Pelican State Rally every year. All of this began to change due to a lack of participation and people aging out. This trend is not unique to Louisiana but has occurred throughout the country.

The Louisiana Unit name was changed to Louisiana Airstream Club in 2016. We now have 64 regular members and 25 affiliate members, which is about average nationwide. Our Club dues were \$5 in 1968, then raised to \$10 in 2004, and raised to \$15 in 2023. We operate on a budget. Our fixed costs are mostly printing supplies, stamps, and office needs. We also incur miscellaneous costs from time to time. We do not charge a Rally fee for our Christmas Rally, and we try to keep our Rally fees as low as possible. We also try to negotiate campground rates to keep costs down.

We have an Executive Board that meets 5-6 times a year and we work together as a team. We have a member meeting 2-3 times a year to keep members informed, normally at a Rally or a luncheon.

My intention in this message is to share our club history. I would like to encourage each member to give a little of your time, share your ideas, share your enthusiasm, and encourage everyone to get involved. By giving of your time, I mean helping the host to clean up, wash dishes, put out trash, help

the cook, etc. Do something so just a few are not carrying the load. It's everybody's Club. Don't be shy about asking what you can do, and I will not be shy about telling you what to do. I know that some of us are not able to help because of health issues, and that's understandable. We will help you in any way we can!

What I mean by sharing your ideas: Tell us what you would like the Club to be for you. Talk to us, give us ideas about Rallies or activities. Communication is a two-way street. We need your input and feedback so we can plan and adjust our goals accordingly. Our future and our history are in your hands, not just the leadership.

In conclusion, our main goal is to have fun, which we do, and to have Rallies at interesting places. We don't need to always have a structured Rally. Just chilling out by a campfire and having our favorite beverage is all we need. I'm excited about the future of our Club and can't wait to hear from everyone. DID YOU KNOW

A couple of months past I wrote an article about flashing headlights when approaching oncoming Airstream Trailers to say hi. But, there is another part of the greeting that has almost passed with time.

As the story goes; Once upon a time, nearly all airstreamers were able to talk to one another as they passed on the road. As you saw the oncoming trailer or motorhome approach, you could see the "Big Red Numbers" on the unit, your co-pilot would then look up the number in our handy (free) membership book and know their name and unit number. We would then acknowledge them with our handy CB radios. Traveling was fun, meeting people, getting road conditions, and other great information.

Jumping back a few years, in 1984 when we joined the club, airstreamers were almost required to have a CB tuned to channel 14 known as the Wally Byam channel. Every Airstream had one and most had one in their trailers. At internationals, we would have a Wally Byam Control radio station to disperse information, weather, and events, every morning and afternoon. Today we have the WBCCI Amateur Radio club that uses 2 meters and above, but users must have an FCC Radio License to operate. I have a radio license to operate a 2-meter radio, but not many members do or want to study to obtain a license. A CB radio uses a line of sight to transmit where a 2-meter would bounce radio waves off layers of atmosphere for a greater range. A properly tuned CB would transmit about 3 miles or more depending on the landscape, whereas a turned 2-meter would reach about 15 miles or hit a relay station and bounce waves onto another relay and so forth.

The biggest advantage of a CB is caravaning, (no more than 4 units together so as not to block road traffic). You see a lot of things along the road that you want to share but don't have time to use an I-phone. Since retiring in 2010, we have been on around 32 caravans, led 3, and assistant on 3 others. I have both a CB and 2-meter rig in my vehicle and whenever I travel with others I request they have one also. Traveling is fun again.

HOW TO PACK YOUR RY FOR A CAMPING TRIP

Whether you're a first-timer or a pro, packing your RV takes some forethought and planning. And even though it might seem like your RV has endless shelves, cabinets, and nooks and crannies, you'll soon find that space is limited. To help make the most of your RV's space, this RV packing checklist includes a few dos, and don'ts, tips, and tricks to get you started.

Remember to space your heavy items throughout the RV to avoid weighing down one side of the rig. Do this both from front to back and side to side. Staying as light as possible is important to keep your rig under the necessary payload and towing capacity limits.

Documents and Important Information

When it comes to bringing along your important information, think about anything you might need to have documentation of while on the road. Your vehicle registration, campground reservations, <u>roadside assistance</u> info, and all of your RV and camping packing lists should be kept in a folder for easy access.

You'll also need IDs and driver's licenses, your RV manual (or access to a digital copy), your RV's maintenance history, and any relevant medical documents or other personal items.

Store your documents in a safe place, away from any moisture or excessive temperatures. A <u>waterproof folder</u> is ideal for keeping your documents dry and reduces exposure to humidity. Some RVers also use a clipboard or notebook when walking through their setup and breakdown checklists to mark their progress.


