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Days One and Two

Our first stop was at the Jellystone Park in Akron/Canton, Ohio. We kicked off with a welcome dinner at the Hartville Kitchen, an Amish restaurant with great home cooking.

The next day was jam packed, starting with a visit to the memorial, museum and home of William McKinley. We climbed the 108 steps up to the two marble caskets of our 25th President (March 1807 until his assassination in 1901) and his wife. The museum was informative and the home held an impressive collection of period artifacts and styles.

Then we were off to the National Football League Hall Of Fame. After a guidk lunch in the cafe there we had an

Days Three, Four and Five at East Harbor State Park in Sandusky, Ohio

After a low-key travel day, we were up and at 'em for an early call to visit president #2, Rutherford B. Hayes. This might have been the highlight of the four 19th and early 20th Century presidents on our trip. The property, on the grounds of the gorgeous Spiegel Grove in Fremont, Ohio, contained the Presidential Library and Museum as well as the family home of Hayes and descendants from 1873 to 1965. Beautifully preserved and restored, it was such a pleasure to tour, again led by a terrific guide who had grown up in the town and had an

obvious affection for the family's story and the property. The grove was dotted with trees affixed with plaques commemorating visits by dignitaries down through the years, including sitting presidents. What an unexpected treasure the Morgans showed us!








That stop was rounded out with a group dinner at the unique and delightful Twin Oast Brewery in Port Clinton. Wow, what a place, with a great vibe and delicious food. It was a very special evening. Only pictures can do it justice.



The next day we had a relaxing day on our own but continued the fun in the evening for a tour, tasting and dinner at the Firelands Winery, the oldest and largest in Ohio. The name came from the original winery was located in 1880 and named because Connecticut winemakers whose homes were burned by the British relocated there in 1779. Once again a super enthusiastic guide led our tour and talked us through the tasting of four of Firelands wines from different grape varietals which was followed by a modest dinner in the tasting room.





Days Six and Seven at Indian Lake State Park

After a 90 minute drive in the morning, we met in Marion, Ohio, site of the Presidential Library and home of Warren G. Harding who, like William McKinley before him, was famous for his presidential front porch campaign. He brought the public and the press to him rather than campaigning from trains. Very friendly to the press, he built a "press room" in a small





building in the back yard of the house. The library was a modest museum with some oddities displayed like a gigantic paper mache potato, presented as a gift during his trip to Idaho. An hour's drive from there took us to our next stop at Indian Lakes State Park.

The next day found us at the Airstream factory in Jackson Center. If you have never been there, put it on your bucket list as an Airstream owner. Touring the factory floor and visiting the museum is not to be missed!



We ended that day with a smashing pot luck dinner highlighted by Bev Bevis' chili and Pam Reising's Ohio-famous Buckeye dessert. So much fun.













Days Eight and Nine at Indian Lake State Park

Our travel day was broken up by a visit to Wright-Patterson AF Base, home to the National Airfare Museum, which is huge (several times bigger than the Air and Space Museum in D.C.). Everyone was on their own to tour the vast galleries, arranged in chronological order from the Wright Brothers and WWI all the way through to our current space age. There were four interesting movies to choose from (ask Liz who saw them all). Again, like the NFL Museum, overwhelming.







Our final "presidential" visit was the next day to Ulysses S. Grant's birthplace and a few miles away, his boyhood home. We just can't get enough of over-enthusiastic docents and these two sites did not disappoint. We learned all kinds of details about Grant's parents and ancestors, that his first name was actually Hiram, but his dad wanted Ulysses. Aparently the "S" in his name stands for nothing in particular. We heard from both guides multiple times that Ulysses was bound and determined not to be the son to carry on the family's tannery business. In the hope of helping young Ulysses find his path, his father arranged through contacts to get him into West Point. The rest, as they say, is history. Both sites were enthralling visits.




Our day ended with a delicious pizza feast under the watchful eye of Smokey the Bear and Pete West.

The next day the Kohlers, the Wests and the Formosos were treated to the Queen of Enthusiastic Guides (her energy could have lit up a small city) at the Preservation Distillery right in Bardstown. They have a beautiful property including a farm with longhorn steer.







That evening our farewell dinner was at Mammy's Kitchen and Bar on Stephen Foster Avenue in Bardstown. They provided lots, and I mean lots, of very down home cooking. Think deep fried cinnamon roll and cornbread burger. We did not leave there hungry.
