



The world is a play on a stage, and so is your picture.

- Every picture is a play.
- The play takes place on a stage.
- It has a small number of main actors, usually just one.
- It has contributing actors:
 - ✓ should <u>never</u> diminish or distract from the main actor
 - √ shed extra light on main actor if possible

The main actor must be plainly evident to anybody who looks at your photo.

Photographic Composition:

Nine techniques to highlight the main actor. More time on more important or "harder" techniques. Hint: None of them are rocket science!


Everything can be done with (almost) any camera: iPhone, Galaxy, dSLR, or mirrorless.





Composition: Highlight with Proximity

The main actor get the most real estate.






Composition: Rule of Thirds 1

Main Actor location; direction; alignment

Highlighting with Background or Foreground











Composition: Bokeh

A little bokeh or a lot?










Defining Main Actor with Action Effects


Leading Viewers Eyes with Leading Lines

Composition: Negative Space

Highlighting the silhouette of the main actor

Using the background to paint the shape of the main actor(s)

More than just a camera. Likely need image software for this.



Somewhat Harder Stuff: Roadmap

Composition: Highlighting with Bokeh Using Software of a Cell Phone

Select "portrait" mode

Use slider to adjust amount of blur










Composition: Highlighting with Bokeh

Using Optics of dSLR / Mirrorless

Turn mode dial to AV mode (sometimes called A mode)

A little bokeh, a lot of bokeh: Use roller knob to adjust amount of bokeh.

Footnote: Optical, not software. Some cases may require tripod, depending on lighting.



Composition with Action Effects:

Two Sides of the Same Coin: Shutter Speed

Stop action: <u>fast</u> shutter (1/2000 sec) →

Blurred action: <u>slow</u> shutter (3/10 sec) →



Slow shutter speeds require a tripod.


Composition with Action Effects: iPhone and Samsung Galaxy


- Currently not natively supported on iPhone
 - Find 3rd party app
- Recent Galaxy (Android)
 - Three steps:
 - Pro Mode → Shutter speed → Use slider
 - Slow shutter speed → use tripod or similar

Composition with Action Effects:

Shutter Speed on dSLR / mirrorless: well supported

- Select TV mode on mode dial
- Use roller knob to adjust speed of shutter
- Slow shutter speed → use tripod or similar





Composition of Photos: End of Story

Define your experience of main actor(s) by using one or more in <u>every</u>picture!

- Proximity, real estate occupied by main actor
- Avoid ugly, distracting backgrounds
- Rule of Thirds: Location, direction, alignment
- Bokeh for backgrounds or foregrounds
- Stop action / blurred movement

- Leading lines to what?
- Repeated geometry
- Negative space: Silhouette!
- Selective color
