

# What do I need to know about choosing our new club leadership? by Bard Fuller

Many will remember three years ago our International Club leadership model was significantly changed. Here is the present drill.

- 1) Every two years we get to pick our region officers. This happens on even years. So, no worries this year, as that election will be in 2026.
- 2) Every two years (odd years) all Airstream Club members get to elect nine members to sit on the Executive Council (EC). This is kind of like a town council. This year there are twelve members volunteering to be candidates for these nine positions. This election will take place June 1-15. Every Airstream Club member gets a vote. Each spouse/partner gets a vote even if there is only one Big Red Number. An email invitation to vote online will come from ACI if each person has an email on record with the club. The 2025-2027 Executive Council will be those nine candidates that have the highest vote count.

#### How do I know who to vote for?

You should do your homework. Information about all the candidates can be found on the ACI website. This information can be found using the upper tool bar on the ACI website home page and choose "ABOUT" then clicking on "2025 Executive Council Candidates". Here you will see written statements and video presentations from each candidate as well as an interview done with each candidate.

You may ask: "How is a President chosen in our International Club?" Well, this vote is done for all the international officers by the 22 members of the International Board of Trustees (IBT). The IBT is comprised of 12 region presidents and 10 members of the EC.

Two years ago, this governing system was new and confusing. This year it should sound more familiar and less confusing. Two years from now it will be easy peasy - actually, it will then be tradition.

Hope this helps so that all can respond to the ACI election email with an informed vote.




