Thank you, Top of Georgia for your warm welcome and generous hospitality.
















Treasurer's Report for June 2025

A Trip to Bahia Honda State Park in the Florida Keys by Kathy Estabrook

At the end of April, Todd and I finally got our chance to stay at Bahia Honda State Park which, even for Florida residents, is a difficult reservation to get. It is located near Big Pine Key, about 45 minutes or so from Key West. A distinctive feature of the park is the Old Bahia Honda Bridge which was part of the East Coast Railway built by Henry Flagler between 1905 and 1912 and was later turned into a road which became part of the original overseas highway. Use of this bridge stopped in 1972. Although our campsite was not directly on the water, it was beautifully shaded, which was helpful during the heat of the day. There were plenty of open spaces where we were able to enjoy the view, watch the sunset, and we even saw a few manatees!

Although we had been to The Florida Keys before, we did visit two places that were brand new to us. One of them was Pigeon Key, which was the home base for railroad workers constructing the old seven-mile bridge. The cost included a tram ride to the island on the old bridge and a guided tour. Our tour guide was very informative, admitting she had a crush on Henry Flagler and told us all about him, the history of the railroad and Pigeon Key itself. There was also time to explore the historical buildings and museum.

Another day, we ventured down to Key West and visited The Key West Butterfly and Nature Conservatory. Visitors get to walk through a glass dome among hundreds of free flying butterflies. There are also exotic birds and even two flamingos! Your ticket gives you the ability to come back as many times as you want during that same day. We went through multiple times and on our way out one butterfly tried to hitch a ride out on Todd's shoulder but was caught by the sharp-eyed staff member at the door.

The last night we were there, there was a free "Stargazing at Bahia Honda State Park" event and with an astronomer who set up his telescope and we looked at planets, star clusters and galaxies. He also pointed out numerous constellations and shared other interesting information about telescopes and planetary objects.

These are just a few of the things we did during our trip and relaxing near the water with no agenda is never a bad thing. Bahia Honda State Park has a lot to offer: beautiful views, sandy beaches, short hiking trails and a small concession/beach store.

I already miss the gorgeous colors in the water and the smell of the salt air. We hope to make it back there soon!

Now and then, everybody has to be a SOB (Some other brand)!


That's exactly what Alan and I were for three weeks in May when we picked up a new Winnebago MinnieWinnie 25B from the factory in Iowa and delivered it to Alaska. At least we didn't bring it home. It wasn't an Airstream, but we were comfortable on our Spring Adventure Package. We started in Iowa and ventured through South Dakota, where we drove through the Badlands, ate at the famous Wall Drug store, ventured past the Black Hills, and ate an ice cream cone in the shade of Mt. Rushmore, all in just two days. If you ever want a straight flat road, I-80 is the one. It's easy except when the wind blows at 35 knots. Even the cruise control won't work. It's the only flat thing between South Dakota and Alaska. There's always a view of the mountains! In Wyoming, we enjoyed the Big Horns, where we saw a cowboy herding his lost cattle on a 4-wheeler. In Yellowstone, we had a snowstorm and a hailstorm all in one evening. The snow let up in Alberta, British Columbia, and Yukon, but there were piles of it everywhere. Over the Canadian line what there weren't a lot of were restaurants, cafes, or diners. I had to do something I'm not used to doing, use the kitchen! The snow was especially heavy in Banff and on the Icefield Parkway to Jasper. That stretch, probably the most scenic, included a couple of glaciers and our very first bear sighting. The Al-Can was rough with many frost heaves, but the most challenging road was the Top of the World Highway, which isn't a highway at all, but a dirt road with no guardrails from Dawson City to Chicken. It included a ferry crossing and a border crossing into Alaska. We arrived in Chicken on the first day the cafe opened, their very first customer of the season. There were only 3 other establishments in the town with a population of 12 in 2020. Snow, bison, and bears everywhere.

We didn't see a moose until we were in Denali. There's nothing more ferocious than a moose with her baby. We saw her chase a dog and its owner. And then heard she attacked two more off-leash dogs the morning we left. Those animals are huge, at least 6 feet to their shoulder, and they use their front hooves to crush anything that they think threatens their babies.


We made it to Anchorage via Fairbanks. If you are ever in Fairbanks, eat at the Salmon Bake, an experience as well as

good food. Or, try Soapy Smith's downtown and talk to the owner, who will tell you everything you want to know about Alaska. Our favorite in Anchorage was the Moose Tooth. We know Moe welcomed her with open arms and endless kisses. They're finally back together — just as it was always meant to be.



Until we meet again, sweet Jenna... We love you so very much. Always and forever.



Peach Bread Recipe

This Peach Bread is a wonderful recipe to incorporate summer peaches. Delicious, moist quick bread full of ripe diced peaches with a easy peach glaze.

Ingredients

For the Bread:

- •3/4 cup granulated sugar 150 grams
- •1/2 cup 2% milk 4 ounces
- •1/2 cup canola oil (vegetable or coconut oil)
- 1 large egg
- •1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- •2 cups <u>all-purpose flour</u> 260 grams
- •2 teaspoons <u>baking powder</u>
- •1/4 teaspoon salt
- •2 cups diced fresh peaches

For the Glaze:

- •2 cups powdered sugar
- •2 tablespoons melted butter
- •1/3 cup finely diced peaches (peeled and drained of any extra juice)
- •1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- •1-2 tablespoons heavy cream or milk** (optional)

Instructions

- •Preheat the oven to 350°F.
- •In a medium bowl, stir together the sugar, milk, oil, egg and vanilla.
- •3/4 cup granulated sugar, 1/2 cup 2% milk, 1/2 cup canola oil, 1 large egg, 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- •In a separate bowl, combine the flour, baking powder and salt. Add the dry ingredients to the wet ingredients and stir until just combined.
- •2 cups all-purpose flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt
- •Fold the peaches gently into the batter.
- •2 cups diced fresh peaches
- •Pour the bread batter into a greased 9"x5" bread pan. Bake at 350°F for 55-60 minutes. A toothpick inserted in the center of the bread should come out clean. Allow the bread to cool for 10 minutes, then remove the bread to a wire rack to cool completely.
- •To make the glaze, combine the powdered sugar, melted butter, diced peaches and extract in a small bowl. Mix until it is smooth. Add heavy cream only if needed to get the glaze to a drizzle consistency.
- •2 cups powdered sugar, 2 tablespoons melted butter, 1/3 cup finely diced peaches, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract, 1-2 tablespoons heavy cream or milk**
- •Once the bread is cool, spread the glaze on top of the bread. Slice and serve.
- •Store the bread in an airtight container in the refrigerator.

Notes

**We didn't need any milk or cream to make the glaze spreadable, but it may depend on the juiciness of your peaches. The glaze will be very thick and look like it is not mixing up, but if you keep mixing, it should create a nice creamy peachish glaze as shown. If it doesn't, add milk or heavy cream 1 tablespoon at a time. The glaze will soften as it sits too since the sugar pulls out juices from the peaches. Keep this in mind when adding milk and don't add too much!
