

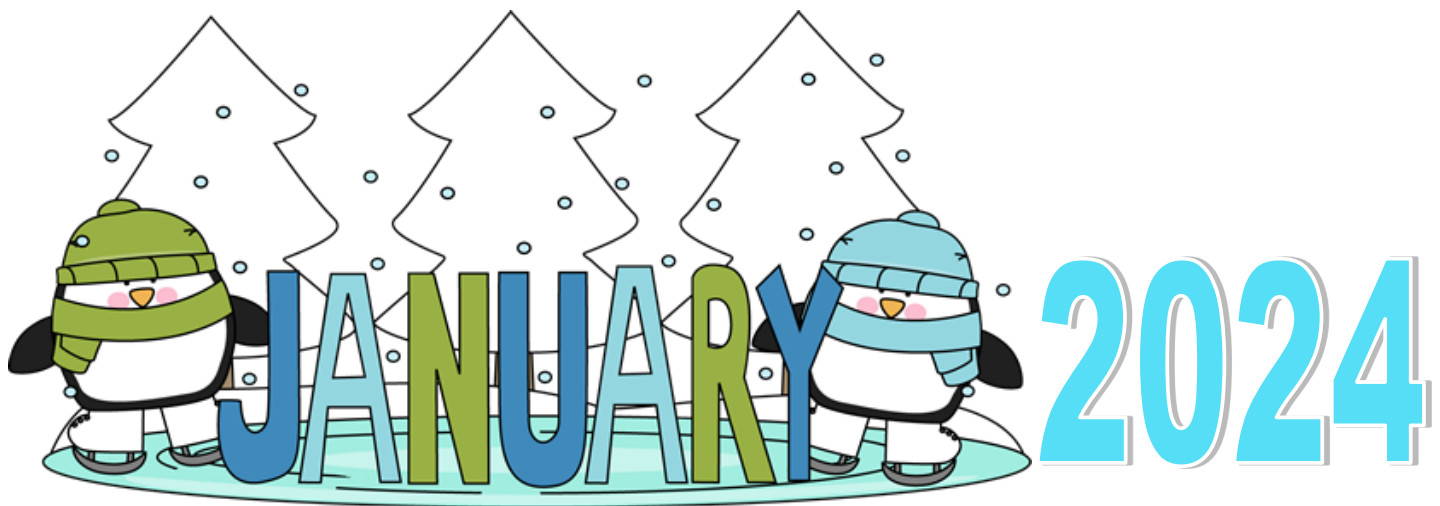

Costanoa Rally

October 12th—16th, 2023

The Greater Bay Area Airstream Club hosted another fun filled rally at Costanoa. It is an eco-adventure resort located in Pescadero, California, Pescadero was established in 1856 and by the 1890s the town was know as an excellent trout fishing location which helped establish it as a booming seaside resort.

Visitors who braved the grueling mountain stage crossing to Pescadero in the late 19th century found vine-covered lodgings in Sarah Swanton's hotel and happy "gem" hunting at Pebble Beach. At first glance Pescadero looks like many small American towns but there is one significant difference. It has no Main Street. Instead all of the commerce is on Stage Road, which runs through the town. Years ago, Pescadero was on the main road along the coast, and stage coaches brought hundreds of visitors to the area. Pescadero has the oldest surviving Protestant Church on the Peninsula. Built in the classical revival style in 1867, it was declared a state historical landmark in 1984.



Early Pescadero was a rough and tumble place, with many settlers drawn west for the gold rush settling in the coastal area that reminded them of New England.

The early townspeople were farmers and ranchers, and later were joined by fishermen and lumberjacks, supplying lumber to rebuild San Francisco after the Great Earthquake of 1906. Later, Pescadero became a vacation destination for people from San Francisco, being a one day stagecoach ride from the city.

The early visitors stopped at Duarte's Tavern established in 1894 by Frank Duarte. The original tavern served as a saloon and barbershop. They began offering food and in 1930's they introduced their legendary pies and in the 1960's they introduced cream of artichoke soup. Duarte's is family owned. There was a fire in the town in 1920's and the only original item in the tavern is the bar.



The town also has a famous lighthouse, Pigeon Point Lighthouse, which opened in 1872. It is one of the tallest lighthouses in America. There have been several ships that have crashed on the rocky coast near the lighthouse. The lighthouse gets its name from the ship, the Carrier Pigeon that got confused in the fog and crashed on the rocky bottom in 1853. The ship and its cargo were destroyed but all of the crew escaped. The worst wreck occurred in August 1929, when the tanker, S.C.T. Dodd collided with the San Juan passenger ship. Seventy-five people died and only one child, Hollis Lee Pifer, age 6, survived.



The rally began on Thursday, October 12th. Campers began to arrive in the afternoon. The group kicked off the rally with a Happy Hour to mingle with the other campers. Everyone had dinner on their own and meetup after dinner to enjoy a campfire.

On Friday, October 13th campers were able to enjoy on their own the many activities Costanoa has to offer (e.g. hiking, biking, kayaking, horse-back riding, yoga classes, bird watching, stargazing, wine tasting, and tie-dye workshops). The Happy Hour on Friday was a Boxed Wine Tasting Delight. Campers were asked to bring an open mind and think inside the box! At the wine tasting, campers were asked to bring an appetizer to share for a light dinner or have dinner on your own. On Saturday, October 14th campers could enjoy the activities at Costanoa or drive to Santa Cruz, which is 24 miles south on Highway 1.

During the afternoon campers could gather to make pico de gallo. All you needed to bring was a sharp knife, a cutting board and be ready to chop. Everyone was invited to attend the no host Happy Hour. Bodega Bay Installation Rally

November 9th—13th, 2023

The Greater Bay Area Airstream Group hosted a rally at Bodega Bay RV Park. The RV Park has been owned and operated by the Adams family since 1967. Bodega Bay is a shallow, rocky inlet of the Pacific Ocean on the coast of northern California. It is approximately 5 miles across and is located approximately 40 miles northwest of San Francisco and 20 miles west of Santa Rosa. The bay straddles the boundary between Sonoma County to the north and Marin County to the south. The bay is a marine habitat used for navigation, recreation (including swimming and surfing), and commercial and sport fishing.

Bodega Bay is protected on its north end from the Pacific Ocean by Bodega Head, which shelters the small Bodega Harbor and is separated from the main bay by a jetty. The Coast Miwok Native Americans lived on the shores of Bodega Bay and were the town's first documented residents. There is speculation that Bodega Bay may have been Sir Francis Drake's *Nova Albion* landing location on the California coast. The first documented European's that charted Bodega Bay were the Spaniards. Bodega Bay is named after Juan Francisco de la Bodega y Quadra, who explored the area in 1775. The bay that was originally named for him was not the present day Bodega Bay, but Tomales Bay. His ship, the *Sonora*, never saw the entrance to (the present day) Bodega Harbor or knew of the lagoon to the north. He planned to return and establish a colony and a mission but it was decided, that the location was not ideal.



The first Russians to see Bodega Bay came in 1807 from the Russian-American Company (RAC). They came aboard the Peacock hunting ship. They returned to Alaska and reported on the area that they found. When they returned to Bodega Bay in 1809 on the Kodiak they surveyed the area to establish a settlement with temporary buildings to house the ship's crew.



The Kodiak remained in Bodega Bay until October, 1809. When the ship returned to Alaska they had more than 2,000 sea otter pelts. They reported that Bodega Bay had abundant fur bearing mammals, fish, timber and tillable lands. When they returned to Bodeg Bay they established a permanent settlement in the area. In 1811, they returned aboard the Chirikov, but found fewer otters. Three American ships were also operating in the area from a base in Drake's Bay, sending hunters into San Francisco Bay and the surrounding bays.

- The RAC returned to present day Bodega Harbor aboard the Chirikov on March 15, 1812. During 1812 Fort Ross was built it was located about 20 miles south.
- Russian chart of Fort Ross to Bodega Bay, 1817-18. Bodega Harbor and Bay appear in the upper right. On the return trip they found that the otter population was scarce and that numerous American and British hunters were also hunting otters there. Fort Ross then became the permanent Russian settlement. By 1817 the sea otter population was practically eliminated by international over-hunting. The earliest European structures in Bodega Bay were built by RAC (wharf, warehouse and barracks).



After the Mexican-American War and the 1848 Mexican Cession Bodega Bay became an United States territory. It remained an active harbor for shipping lumber until the 1870s, when the North Pacific Coast Railroad was built, bypassing the coast in favor of a more inland route.

Bodega Bay is also famous for being the setting for the 1963 Alfred Hitchcock horror film, "The Birds" starred Rod Taylor, Tippi Hedren and Suzanne Pleshette.

The rally kicked off on Thursday, November 9, 2023 at Wayne and Jill Impink's campsite for a Happy Hour to celebrate Wayne's birthday! It was a great time to meet new friends and get reacquainted with old friends. Dinner on Thursday night was on your own. After dinner campers met to join the host for a campfire.

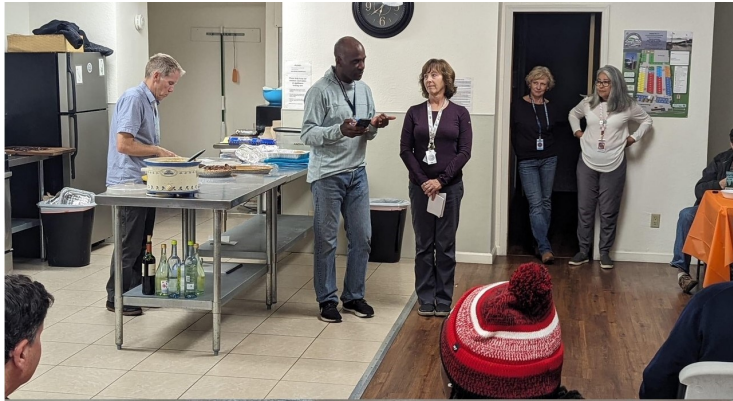

December 14—16, 2023**

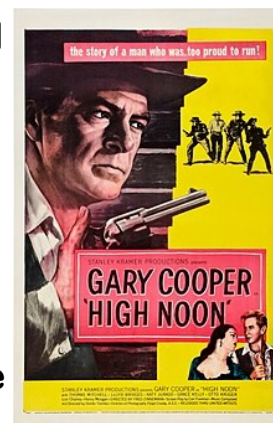

The Greater Bay Area Airstream Club hosted a Feliz Navidad Rally at Black Oak Casino RV Park December 14th—16th, 2023. Black Oak Casino is located in the city of Tuolumne. Like many towns in the Sierra Foot-hills Tuolumne is known for a history of logging operations. Remnants of logging railroads are still present today. The area's first non-Indian settlers, was the Franklin Summers family, who arrived in 1854 and built a log cabin here. From 1856 through 1857 the area experienced the East Belt Placer Gold Rush. In 1858, James Blakely discovered the first quartz lode here and named it 'Eureka.' The mine became the nucleus of the town of Summersville, which was later called Carters and finally became Tuolumne. Other mining towns lively in the gold rush days were Long Gulch, two miles south, and Cherokee, two miles north.

Several entrepreneurs in the 1970s attempted to bring tourism to Tuolumne using the areas railroad history. Unfortunately, both ventures failed. The Tuolumne Band of Me-Wuk Indians, is headquartered in Tuolumne. The tribe contributed to new growth in the city with revenues from the Black Oak Casino, which is owned and operated by the Tuolumne Band.

Tuolumne is the birthplace of the Vaudevillian performer and hipster comedian Lord Buckley, born Richard Myrle Buckley, April 5, 1906, died November 12, 1960. In 1951, scenes of the western, "High Noon", starring Gary Cooper, were filmed in Tuolumne. Cooper went to St. Joseph's Church to solicit help from the townspeople for the movie.



Some campers checked in early on Wednesday, December 13th with more campers joining them on Thursday December 14th. The campers who arrived early had self-organized happy hours, dinner and activities.

Thirty-Five of the Best Spots for RV Camping in Northern California

The information in this article came from the CS Ginger Blog. I split the information between the last two newsletters. In the last newsletter we covered eleven through twenty-five. We will cover the remaining campgrounds in this newsletter. I hope you found some you might like to visit.

26. Trinity River Resort and RV Park is a rustic campground only 35 minutes from Redding. This is a beautiful private park that is great for families. It is party free campground. If you are looking for a place to smoke marijuana or have a party, you will be asked to leave.

Fishermen love this park. It is a great spot for catching steelhead, salmon, and brown trout. The location is great. It is only 1 mile from Lewiston Lake and close to great bass fishing at Trinity Lake.



27. Manchester Beach KOA Journey is an ideal campground for visiting the Mendocino Coast. They have an access trail that leads you to the Pacific Ocean where you can spend hours walking on the beach or tide-pooling.

There are multiple lighthouses nearby, magnificent red-woods, and Anderson Valley wineries. They can fit good-sized RVs (up to 65 feet in length). They also have great group options. At camp, enjoy hayrides, ice cream socials, family activities, wine tastings and holiday events. You'll find bocce courts, a disc golf course, large interactive dog park, community camp-fire area and year-round hot tub.



28. Francis Beach Campground has 52 campsites and ocean views. It is just steps from sandy California beaches. You will love camping at **Francis Beach Campground**. This Northern California RV campground has lots to offer. Each site has a picnic table and fire ring. Half of the camp sites offer electrical hookups. There are no water/sewer hookups at the campsites.

Half Moon Bay State Beach provides excellent whale watching so make sure you bring your binoculars and fishing poles. However, swimming is not recommended because of the rip currents. This is a beautiful place to go RV camping in Northern California.



29. Elk Country RV Resort and Campground is a great Northern California campground. It has nearly 200 acres of the best RV camping in Northern California. They have their own private lake, hiking trails, and creek.



Previously this campground was split into Redwood Lake Resort and Stone Lagoon Campground's but is now Elk Country Resort and Campground. It is conveniently located on Hwy 101 and you can check out the local elk herd that roams nearby. The campgrounds is between Orick and Eureka, California.

This fabulous park is a great option, if you are interested in experiencing the beach and the Redwood National Park.

There are so many outdoor activities within 5 minutes of the park. You can fish, swim, horseback ride, or go kayaking. The Roosevelt Elk are seen in the campground every day. You will be very pleased with Elk Country RV Resort.





30. Albee Creek Campground is the best Humboldt Redwoods campgrounds. Unfortunately, it is the most likely to be full, so make sure to make your reservations early. It is a small quiet campground, and does not fit large RVs. There is little to no traffic noise.

This campground has great views of the redwoods and is one of the best places for a scenic drive. The campground is not super level, since it is on a little bit of a hillside. The best sites are 40 and 39. They are the most private and near the creek. If those are not available, you will want sites 1 and 2.

The campground is a little bit off the beaten path making it great for hiking but the drive is one of the most impressive Northern California redwoods drives off the avenue of the giants. This is a great redwood campsite, if you are looking to see the giant redwoods in Northern California in your RV or camper.



They can fit a 33 ft RV and a 24-foot bumper pull-out camper. This campground is open May through mid October.

31. Burlington Campground is another great campground off the Avenue of the Giants in Northern California. It is adjacent to the Visitor Center, and near the South Fork of the Eel River. A summer bridge across the river allows access to hiking trails. The trip to this campground is very scenic drive and very doable with a large RV.

This camp is open year-round. It has a picnic table, food locker, and fire grill but there are no hookups. There are close hiking trails and it is also close to the South Fork of the Eel River, if you are interested in fishing or swimming.



32. Golden Pine RV Park is a great campground for Northern RV camping. It is along the June Lake Loop and has full hookups, picnic tables, and a fire ring. They have everything you need including showers and fish cleaning facilities.

There is an easy walk to Gull Lake or you can head over to the Village of June Lake. They have 26 sites available, and they make for a great outdoor family experience.

33. Sierra Skies RV Park is located



between the towering Sierra Buttes and the north fork of the Yuba River in historic Sierra City. The river runs through the property. The park offers one of the best and deepest swimming locations on the North Fork of the Yuba River. There are several restaurants close by in the historic town of Sierra Skies.

There are many outdoor activities to enjoy here: swimming in the North Fork, Gold Mining, hiking and fishing. It is just a short five mile



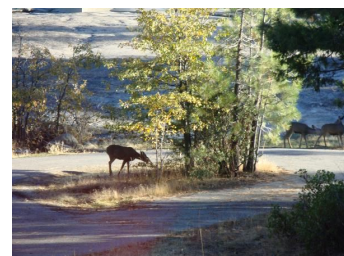
drive to Bassetts, the gateway to the Lake Basin Recreation Area. This RV Park is a perfect Northern California RV destination.

34. Camp Edison was built in



1963 on Shaver Lake and is a favorite vacation spot for many RV travelers in Northern California. The campground is large with over 250 campsites available. You can find everything you are looking for here, from a romantic adventure, to a family getaway. They have a campsite that is going to fit your needs. Some of the campsites offer full hookups (electric/water/sewer) and some only offer electric.

This area is great for horseback riding, fishing, and water sports. You will enjoy Camp Edison and the surrounding areas.





35. Indian Well campground at the Lava Bed National Monument is the only campground at the Lava Bed National Monument. Spaces are available on a first-come first-serve basis and they can fit an RV up to 30 feet in length.

They have 43 sites available, but loop B closes for the winter. You can camp here for only \$10.00 a night. If you have questions, you can call the visitor center. This

campground offers no hookups. This is a great place for RV camping in Northern California.

Airstream Recipes

VEGGIE TURKEY TACO LETTUCE WRAPS

Yield: 8 servings Prep . Time: 15 Minutes Cook Time: 15 Minutes

Ingredients

Filling:

- 1 1/2 to 2 pounds lean ground turkey
 - 1/2 cup chopped onion
 - 1 tablespoon chili powder
 - 1 teaspoon ground cumin
 - 1 teaspoon garlic powder
 - 1 teaspoon ground coriander
 - 1 teaspoon kosher salt
 - 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
 - 1/2 cup chicken broth
 - 1 cup chopped broccoli
 - 1 cup chopped cauliflower
 - 1 cup chopped zucchini
- 

- 1 cup chopped carrots
- 8 to 12 ounces tomato sauce
- 2 cups torn spinach or kale

For Serving:

- Romaine lettuce leaves
- Shredded cheese
- Diced avocados
- Fresh cilantro
- Chopped tomatoes
- Sour cream
- Cilantro Lime Dressing (recipe below)



Instructions

1. In a deep 12 inch skillet or saucepan, cook the ground turkey, and chopped onion. Break the meat into small pieces, and cook until it is no longer pink, 3-4 minutes. Drain any excess grease.
2. Add the chili powder, cumin, garlic powder, coriander, and salt, and pepper. Mix well and cook over medium heat for 1 to 2 minutes until sizzling. Stir in the broth and add all of the chopped vegetables except the spinach. Stir to combine. Cover the skillet and cook over medium heat until the vegetables are crisp tender 5 to 6 minutes.
3. Add the tomato sauce and stir to combine. Stir in the spinach. Cook for 2 to 3 minutes until the spinach is wilted and

the filling is warmed through. Season to taste and add additional salt and pepper, if needed.

4. Serve in lettuce wraps or cups with additional toppings.

Notes

Vegetables: the vegetables are customizable based on your tastes. For this recipe use about 4 cups chopped vegetables plus 2 cups chopped spinach or kale. Chop the vegetables into 1/4 inch pieces or slightly smaller.



Creamy Cilantro Lime Dressing

Yield: 12 Servings (2 –3 cups dressing)

Prep Time: 15 Mins **Total Time:** 15 Minutes

Ingredients:

- 1/2 cup buttermilk
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- 1/4 cup salsa verde or green enchilada sauce

- 1 tablespoon fresh lime juice (*from about 1 medium lime*)
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon dried parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon onion powder
- Pinch of dried dill, (*about 1/8 teaspoon*)
- Pinch of coarse Kosher salt
- Pinch of coarsely ground black pepper
- 1/2 cup coarsely chopped cilantro
- 1 green onion, (*white and green parts coarsely chopped*)

Instructions

1. Combine all of the ingredients in a blender and process until smooth. Thin with additional buttermilk, milk, or lime juice, if you want to adjust the consistency.
2. Refrigerate until ready to serve. (*The taste gets better with time. It can be made several days in advance.*)

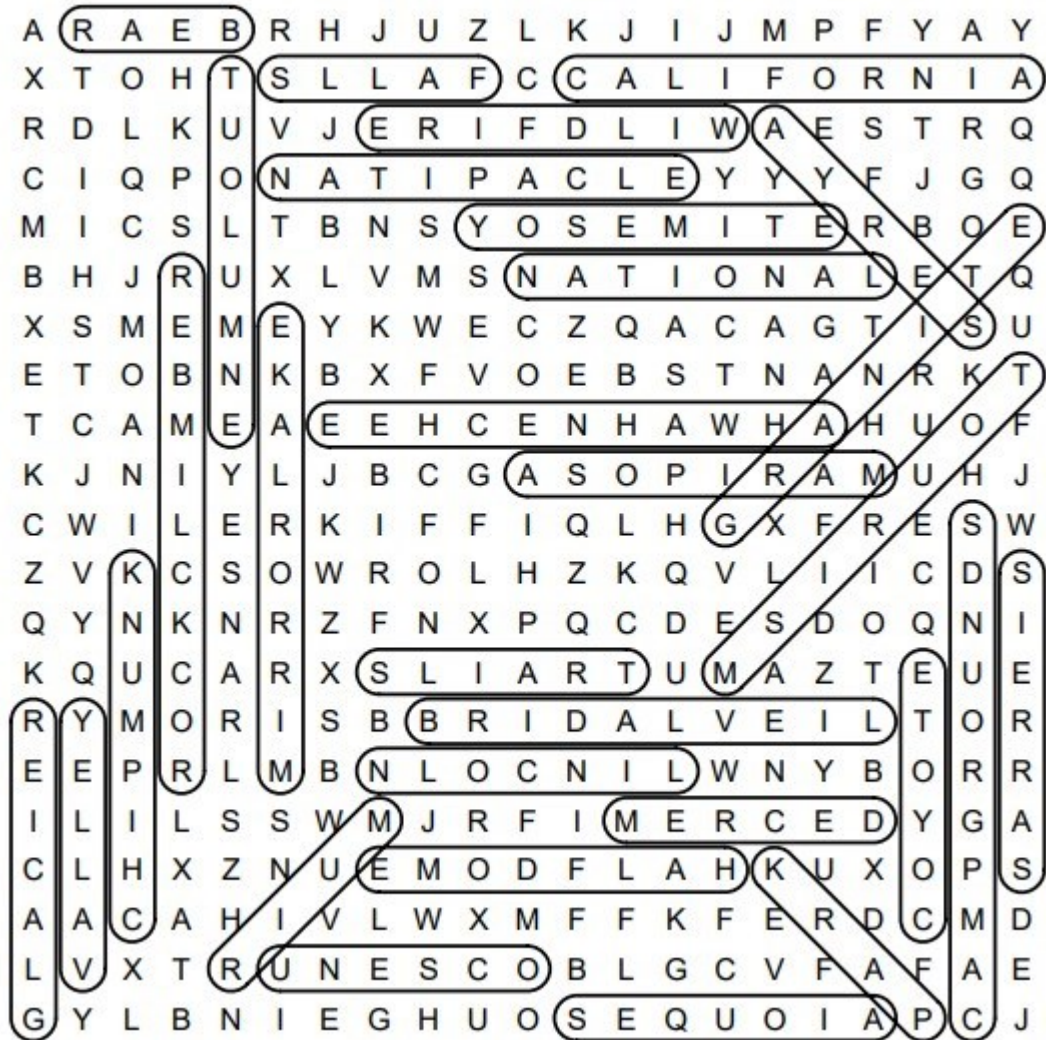
