Marina Dunes Rally

January 18th —21st, 2024

The Greater Bay Area Airstream Club kicked off the New Year with hosting a fun filled rally at Marina Dunes. It is one of the best-located Monterey Bay RV parks, situated near the ocean and close to everything the area has to offer.

William Locke-Paddon a Real Estate Salesman from San Francisco-founded the town of Marina in 1913 after he purchased 1,500 acres of land to subdivide. The city's history is intertwined with Fort Ord which was used since the Mexican–American War. Major growth on the base took place in 1938 with the first joint Army and Navy maneuvers held there in 1940. Fort Ord was decommissioned in 1991, and closed in 1994. After Fort Ord closed, California State University, Monterey Bay, opened and the barracks were transformed into dormitories. As a result of the base closure, some of the last undeveloped natural wildlands on the Monterey Peninsula are now overseen by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), including 86 miles of trails for the public to explore on foot, bike or horseback. In 2012, President Barack Obama designated 14,000 acres of the closed base as a national monument managed by the BLM.

The city of Marina is wonderfully diverse, overflowing with options for

food and drink, culture, and adventure. Marina's vast stretches of dunes and rolling hills make it a world-class destination for outdoor enthusiasts. You can comfortably explore Fort Ord Dunes State Park on the site of the historic military base. It is now home to local flora and fauna. Unlike most of the other coastal cities in California, Marina's coastline remains undeveloped and it has protected rare species of butterflies, buckwheat, and sea lettuce. You can hike or bike through Marina's rolling hills, oak woodlands, and pockets of chaparral at Fort Ord National Monument, which extends into Marina and offers more than 86 miles of serene trails and panoramic vistas.

When it's time to refuel, there are more than 30 locally owned restaurants representing Marina's diverse ethnic make-up, with choices like Vietnamese, Mexican, Japanese, Hawaiian, and more. If you are thirsty you can check out Marina's Urban Wine Row where various wineries in Marina's business district have open tasting rooms on select Saturdays to showcase their bounty in a fun, friendly setting.

The rally began with campers arriving on Thursday, January 18th. After everyone was checked in, a Happy Hour was held in the Club House where campers could meet new friends and reacquaint with old friends. Dinner was held after the Happy Hour with everyone having dinner on their own. Campers enjoyed the beautiful California coast sitting by campfires after dinner.

On Friday, January 19th campers woke up early and had donuts and muffins in the Club House. Interested campers set off in carpools to the Monterey Bay Aquarium. After they enjoyed all of the wonderful sites the aquarium had to offer they enjoyed a late lunch in Monterey. Campers met for another fun Happy Hour, followed by dinner on your own. Everyone met back up after dinner and were treated with an evening of games and campfires.

On Saturday, January 20th, campers met for a hike to the beach and flew their own kites. Mike Blom led another educational wine tasting class in the afternoon. Campers were able to taste after dinner wines. The class was followed by a Happy Hour in the Club House. Dinner was a Bring your Best Potluck. Everyone has one special dish that everyone loves for them to make. 
On Sunday, January 21st, campers packed up and said their goodbyes until the next fun adventure.



San Juan Bautista Rally Betabel RV Park

February 8th — 12th, 2024

San Juan Bautista was founded in 1797 by Fermín de Lasuén, a Spanish Franciscan Priest. He established the Mission of San Juan Bautista to aid in the conversion of the native people to Catholicism. Before Fermin de Lasuén arrived, the Mutsun, a tribe of the Ohlone Nation of Indigenous Californians lived near San Juan Bautista. The Mutsunes lived in villages, and in settlements composed of thatched huts made of willow and native grasses. The Spanish chose this area for the Mission, because of it's fertile cropland, steady water supply, and sizable Indian population. In 1930, the last native speaker of Mutsun, Ascención Solórzano de Cervantes,

died, rendering the Mutsun language extinct.



Shortly after the town was founded, it went through secularization from Mexico (1833), and it was briefly known as San Juan de Castro and was incorporated in 1896. Today, San Juan Bautista is a popular tourist destination. Visitors can see the San Juan Bautista State Historic Park and other important historic sites, as well as cultural institutions like El Teatro Campesino.

Construction of the current mission church began in 1803, and served the community continuously since 1812. The mission is located on the Camino Real, a "royal highway" which connected the California missions and remained well-used until the 19th century.





Mexico revolted against Spain in 1821, and won their independence. In 1834, San Juan Bautista became known as San Juan de Castro. Casa Juan de Anza, is the oldest residence in San Juan Bautista. It was built in 1830. The mission was secularized in 1831, and Castro appointed an executor of the property. He divided and auctioned off the former

mission properties. His son, José Castro, built the Castro Adobe on the south side of the Plaza de San Juan in 1840; however, Castro's frequent involvement in government kept him from spending much time there.

José Antonio Castro was appointed Comandante General of California, in charge of the Mexican Army's operations in California. From San Juan Bautista, Castro ordered the army against potential foreign incursions. Jose Antonio Castro was very concerned about John C. Frémont, an American military officer who conducted a survey of the interior of California. Frémont was told to stay away from the coastal settlements.

However, Frémont broke the agreement by taking his team to Monterey,

which was a potential military target. Castro told Frémont he would have to leave the country. The situation came close to war when Frémont refused to leave and set up a base on Gavilén Poak, everlooking the town

fused to leave and set up a base on Gavilán Peak, overlooking the town of San Juan Baustia. However, fighting was avoided and Frémont, withdrew begrudgingly.

San Juan Bautista was incorporated on May 4, 1896. There were several notable historic events that took place in San Juan Baustia: John Montgomery's successful test flights of his tandem-wing glider in June 1904 and the hypocenter of the 1906 San Francisco earthquake.

The SVAC decided to return to Betabel RV Park to kick off their first rally of the year. It began on Thursday, February 8th, 2024 all campers were invited to a no host Happy Hour and Welcome once they were checked in and settled. Dinner on Thursday night was each camper's responsibility.







Jackson Rancheria Rally March 14th-18th, 2024

The Greater Bay Area Airstream Club sponsored this rally which was held during the St. Patrick's Day weekend at Jackson Rancheria RV Park in Jackson, California. The Jackson area has a rich history. It was inhabited by many generations of Miwok (Miwuk) Native Americans. The Miwoks lived by the creek and adjacent spring. There have been inhabitants in the area for over 160 years. The town grew with the influx of miners after gold was discovered in the Sierra Nevada foothills. The first non-Native Americans came to prospect for gold and were native Californios of Spanish-Mexican descent, and military deserters.




Initially the town was named Botellas or "bottles". It was listed as Botellas on an 1848 map of the Northern California Mining Region prepared by the legendary state historian, H. H. Ban-

croft. Very few of the 1848 miners lived in Botellas, but they shopped at the trading post.

Before the fall of 1849, Botellas became known as Jackson's Creek, after Colonel Alden Jackson, a local lawyer that the miners liked. Miners also named other nearby towns after famous people, Sutter's Creek was named after John Sutter of Sutter's Fort, and Amador Creek was named after Jose Maria Amador. Jackson became known for mining gold, gambling, girls and government.

Many miners left when the mines stopped paying a day's wages. But in the spring, of 1851, prospecting miners discovered gold in the quartz rock ledges near Amador Village, a few miles north of Jack-

and another gold rush began. During this gold rush, Jackson became a market and government center for the region.

Three events in 1851, contributed to the permanency of Jackson:

- 1. It got a post office.
- 2. The U.S. mail stage started delivery.
- 3. There were political spoils from an election to become the county seat of Calaveras.

In 1852 Mokelumne Hill attempted with the aid of the state legislature to wrestle the county seat away from Jackson.

Jackson tried to create a new county of Calaveras north of the river but failed to form a county of Mokelumne in 1852 and 1853,

Jackson incorporated as a town, and was resolved to become the county seat of a new county by whatever name. The infamous live oak tree near the trading post had its first lynching in 1851 and had nine more lynchings by 1855. Jackson's live oak tree was one of most lethal spots in the gold country.


"Hanging Tree" - Marked with a plaque today on Main Street



Jackson continued to request a new county seat and in May, 1854, the governor signed a bill establishing an election to divide Calaveras and create Amador County. That election was held on June 14, 1854. It was so corrupt that the outcome is still unknown today. But northern Calaveras forces won the propaganda war and created a new county. At the first Amador County election, voters selected the county's first officers, and they made Jackson the county seat.

Jackson suffered several devasting fires: one in 1855, that destroyed most of the stores on the westerly side of Main Street and another in 1862, which destroyed most of the stores on Main, Water and Summit Streets. After the fires, the buildings were rebuilt in brick to help prevent fires and some are still standing today.

In the early 19th century the Kennedy, Zeile, and Argonaut mines were part of the economic fabric of Jackson. The town was the first to incorporate in the county. There were 3,000 residents in Jackson at the turn of the century. They had churches, doctors, dentists, hotels, boarding houses and small manufacturing.



There was a terrible disaster at the Argonaut mine in 1922. A huge fire broke out and 47 miners lost their lives. It was California's worst mining disaster. The gold mining industry in Jackson ended in early 1942 and did not resume.

In the 1950's the nickel-in-theslot machines, other gaming, and the houses of ill repute closed. There is a heart shaped plaque on Main Street to commemorate these early days in Jackson's history.

The rally kicked off on Thursday, March 14th, 2024 with a Welcome and Happy Hour. Campers had dinner on their own and joined one of their fellow campers for a campfire after dinner.

On Friday, March 15th, 2024 the host offered campers muffins and fruit to go with their coffee to start off the day. Then campers went to some of the areas many attractions (e.g. hiking, visiting historical sites, shopping, wine tasting, and dining).

After a fun filled day campers met up for another Happy Hour to see old friends and make new ones. Campers had dinner on their own or enjoyed a delicious dinner at one of the areas local restaurants with one of their Airstream friends. After dinner campers met up for more conversation at one of the many campfires.

On Saturday, March 16th campers showed their Irish Pride and wore green. The hosts offered donuts and fruit for breakfast. After break-

fast there was a group tour of the Kennedy Gold Mine. Campers and canines enjoyed the tour and learned about the Jackson area and gold mining. Chris Martindill and Eleanor McFarline held a Rally **Hosting Information Session in the** afternoon. Participants learned about how to host a rally. At the end of the day there was another Happy Hour. Campers were served a small serving of Guinness to celebrate St. Patrick's Day. There was a St. Patrick's Day themed Potluck Dinner after Happy Hour featuring: corned beef, cabbage, potatoes, rolls, roasted vegetable, casseroles, salads and desserts.

After dinner there were campfires to mingle with fellow campers.

On Sunday, March 17th, 2024 we had to say goodbye to many of the campers. The remaining campers experienced one of the many local activities. Everyone met for a final Happy Hour before the end of the rally, Dinner was on your own and some joined a fellow Airstreamer for dinner.

A BBC news crew decided to broadcast an April Fool's Day joke. Producers allowed a cameraman on a shoestring budget of £100 the freedom to create a spoof program. It was supposed to be innocent fun.

To register for the International Rally, go to https:// airstreamclub.org/rally2024. The result was utter chaos, raging newspaper headlines and the polarization of public opinion...all because many people among the audience had failed to realize that spaghetti did not grow on trees.



WHEN A SPAGHETTI TREE HOAX CAUSED A NATIONWIDE UPROAR



My son, Matt said I needed humor in the Newsletter. This article is my attempt at humor. One of the biggest April Fools Hoaxes was the British Spaghetti Tree Hoax.

In 1957, BBC producers released a prank broadcast reporting that

THE SPAGHETTI WEEVIL

If anyone could be fairly blamed for starting all the trouble it would have been freelance cameraman, Charles de Jaeger, an Austrian who had helped create Free French broadcasts during World War II and joined the BBC in 1943. De Jaeger wanted to create a spoof segment for April Fool's Day based on the words of his schoolteacher, who had told the boys in her class that

they were foolish enough to believe that spaghetti grew on trees.

He pitched the idea to the producers of BBC's Panorama segment, a serious and respectable program focusing on current events, society and culture. They agreed. De Jaeger quickly swooped down on a Swiss hotel by Lake Lugano and made every penny of his small budget count towards bringing "homegrown" spaghetti to life in a visual agrarian utopia.

The crescendo of the prank was the participation of eminent journalist Richard Dimbleby, who lent his voice to the broadcast. Dimbleby had become a renowned newsman during World War II. He had braved the front lines, flown with bomber crews on air raids over Germany and described firsthand the horrors of Belsen Concentration Camp. He had thus effectively become a well-known voice of reason and sober, gritty honesty. He was also apparently delighted to be able to use his talents for something silly for a change. Amid scenes of smiling women "harvesting" spaghetti from trees, the stolid, trustworthy voice of Dimbleby described the art of noodle cultivation and the

ravages of the ominous "spaghetti weevil."

Dimbleby did make a point of drawing attention to the broadcast date of April 1st at the conclusion of the segment. But that did nothing to stem the storm that was unleashed.

THE CONTROVERSY

The result was epic. The BBC was inundated with an unprecedented amount of phone calls demanding explanations. Some people recognized that the report was a prank and were outraged. Others wanted the BBC to give them proof to win domestic disputes—the hoax had, in a manner of speaking, provoked "food fights" among families who had divided into camps of believers and non-believers.

Others were fascinated by the apparent horticultural revelation—including aspiring gardeners eager to find out how they could obtain and nurture their own spaghetti bushes. The general state of bafflement that swept across British households in the wake of the BBC report owed to the fact that spaghetti was something of a rare bird in the United Kingdom during the 1950's. Many British people were not too familiar with the dish at that time; it wasn't a staple of mainstream cuisine, nor as widely available as it is now.

Easy One Pot Lasagna

Yield: 6 Servings Prep: 10 Minutes Cook: 20 Minutes Total: 30 Minutes

INGREDIENTS

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 3 Italian sausage links, casing removed
- 1 14.5-ounce can diced tomatoes
- 1 8-ounce can tomato sauce
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1 teaspoon dried basil
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes, optional
- 8 ounces farfalle pasta
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste
- 1 cup shredded mozzarella cheese
- 1/4 cup freshly grated Parmesan
- 1 cup ricotta cheese
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley leaves



INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Heat olive oil in a large skillet over medium high heat. Add Italian sausage and cook until browned, about 3-5 minutes, making sure to crumble the sausage as it cooks; drain excess fat.
- 2. Stir in diced tomatoes, tomato sauce, oregano, basil, garlic powder and red pepper flakes; season with salt and pepper, to taste.
- 3. Bring to a simmer and stir in pasta and 2 cups of water. Bring to a boil; cover, reduce heat and simmer until pasta is cooked through, about 13-15 minutes.
- 4. Remove from heat. Stir in mozzarella and Parmesan cheese until well combined. Using a small cookie scoop, top with dollops of ricotta and cover until heated through, about 2-4 minutes.
- 5. Serve immediately, garnish with parsley, if desired.

Jenny cut up vegetables and put them in a large zip lock bag. She then poured a bottle of Ken's Caesar salad dressing in the bag and marinated the veggies for about an hour.

She poured the veggies onto the griddle and cooked them until they were just tender. They were WONDERFUL. As I remember, she used zucchini, yellow squash, and red bell pepper. Charlie's Favorite: Pumpkin Dog Biscuits



Our Welsh Terrier, Charlie loves these cookies. I freeze them and he gets two biscuits a day. Whenever I open the freezer door he comes running to the kitchen, hoping it's time to get a biscuit. Charlie asked me to include this recipe in the newsletter, because he wanted his Airstream dog friends to enjoy them too.

Ingredients

- 1 Egg
- 2/3 cup pureed pumpkin
- · 2.5 tablespoons flaxseed or olive oil
- 2 cups brown rice flour
- 1/3 cup cold water

Directions

In a large mixing bowl, beat the egg. Then add the pureed pumpkin. Do not use pumpkin pie filling.

Add the oil and brown rice flour and stir until the mixture forms into a dough. You'll notice the dough is very dry.

Add water slowly to the mixture. The dough quickly absorbs the water. If the dough becomes sticky, stop adding the water. Roll the dough on a floured surface to about 1/4 inch thick. Cut the dough into your favorite dog shapes and put on a cookie sheet. Bake in the oven at 350 degrees for 35—40 minutes. They can also be made in a Dash Dog Treat Maker. Fill the bone shapes with the dough, close the lid and bake for several minutes on each side. They can be stored for up to 10 days in an airtight container or freeze them for up to six months.
