Message from our President

The rally and camping season is well underway, and I hope that you've been enjoying the outdoors and the camaraderie that travelling in your Airstream offers. It was great to see many of you at the Comanche Lake Rally in April and I look forward to seeing you at more rallies throughout the year.

The Sacramento Valley Airstream Club (SVAC) plans rallies jointly with the Greater Bay Area Airstream Club (GBAAC). Believe it or not we are already well into planning for the 2025 camping season. Carol Lauderville, our Vice President has been working with Mike Blom, Vice President of the GBAAC, on scheduling rallies for 2025. They've been working hard to get us into the campgrounds we like and to find new campgrounds that we may want to explore. We tried out Comanche Lake and Coachland in Truckee this year, so your feedback on those experiences will help inform future planning. Working with the campgrounds can be a challenge so the sooner we reach out to the campgrounds the more likely it is we can get a

reservation for 25 to 30 trailers between the two clubs.

We have several exciting rallies coming up. I am excited about the rally at Coachland in Truckee in July followed by the rally at Costanoa (between Half Moon Bay and Santa Cruz) in August. Then in September there's the three-club rally in McCloud followed immediately by the Region 12 Rally in South Lake Tahoe.

The McCloud Rally is a three-club joint rally in September at the McCloud RV Park, near Mount Shasta. SVAC and GBAAC have been working with the Northern California Airstream Club (NorCal) on planning this rally and 68 rigs have reservations. This will be a unique rally just before the Region 12 Rally in South Lake Tahoe. We know that many of you going to McCloud will go directly from McCloud to South Lake Tahoe for the Region 12 Rally. If that is your plan, it's likely that there will be informal caravans that come together for that journey.

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- My wife and I are affiliates of NorCal and we went to the boondocking rally at Vinnie's Ranch in Wilton in May. That was a great experience because we got to meet many members of our sister club and we had a chance to test our solar system and to use our generator for the first time. We learned quite a bit about power management, and we were very pleased, because of the heat that weekend, that the generator was able to run our air conditioner!
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The SVAC Board meets regularly, and anyone is welcome to join us. At our last board meeting we set up a system for anyone who is interested to order a small SVAC Flag to put out when camping at a rally. The flags have the SVAC logo, your name, BRN and ham radio or GMRS call sign, if you have one. Details of the ordering process are included in this newsletter. We are also in the process of updating the SVAC By-laws which have not been updated for many years.

Our next board meeting will be held at the Truckee Rally at Coachland, July 13th at 2 pm. As always, please reach out to me, if you have any questions about the club.

The Greater Bay Area Airstream Club hosted a spring rally at Lake Camanche. It was the first time the group had used this campground. The views in this campground were breathtaking. Lake Camanche is an artificial lake in the San Joaquin Valley. It is located at the juncture of Amador, Calaveras, and San Joaquin counties. Its waters are held by Camanche Dam, which was completed in 1963. The lake is fed by the Mokelumne River and the Rabbit and Camanche Creeks. Camanche Reservoir is a source of water for industrial and municipal purposes and also provides flood control.


This region was originally settled during the Gold Rush and consisted of three separate towns: Camanche, Lancha Plana, and Poverty Bar. As the Gold Rush slowed, these towns began to decrease in population. The town of Camanche was originally called Limerick. In 1849 settlers from Iowa named the largest of the three towns “Camanche” after a town in Iowa. The area contained rich mining at nearby Cat Camp, Poverty Bar, and Sand Hill. Its population peaked at 1,500. Mokelumne River water was brought to the town by the Lancha Plana and Poverty Bar Ditches. A fire on June 21, 1873 destroyed Camanche’s large Chinatown. Buhach, an insect powder made from a plant, was manufactured at nearby Hill Ranch. Camanche remained a small town, and was eventually evacuated by the East Bay Municipal Utility District to build the dam and reservoir. The lake was named after the former town of Camanche that now lies beneath its waters.

The rally kicked off on Thursday, April 26, 2024, with a Happy Hour to greet old friends and meet new ones. Thursday night dinner was on your own. Interested campers could host or join a campfire after dinner to further their Airstream group connections or make new ones. On Friday, April 27, 2024 campers were treated to a muffins and fruit breakfast, where the days plans were announced. Following breakfast interested campers could go Trap Shooting with Darren Lopez. On Friday evening there was another Happy Hour where campers could bring an appetizer to share. Dinner was on your own on Friday night too, but maybe everyone had enough appetizers that dinner wasn't needed. Later that evening there were more campfires to socialize with fellow campers. On Saturday, April 28, 2024, campers were treated to muffins and fruit breakfast. After breakfast Rick Watts and his wild peregrine falcon, Jasmine came to talk to the group and explain how Rick and Jasmine hunt together as a team. Dumbarton Quarry RV Park

Fremont, CA

The Sacramento Valley Airstream Club hosted their second rally of the year at the Dumbarton Quarry RV Park. The RV Park opened in 2021 and is located within the Coyote Hills Regional Park. It is next to the eastern shore of the San Francisco Bay in Fremont, California. Dumbarton Quarry Campground is the newest park in the East Bay Regional Park District. It is a full-service campground with easy access to nearby Ardenwood Historic Farm, Mission Peak Regional Preserve, and Don Edwards National Wildlife Refuge.

The City of Fremont's origins began with the founding of Mission San José in 1797 by the Spanish under Padre Fermín Lasuén. However, the area's first inhabitants were the Tuibun Ohlone Indians, which inhabited a nearby village for 2,000 years before the arrival of Europeans in the Mission San Jose area.

The City of Fremont was incorporated on January 23, 1956, when the former towns of Mission San José, Centerville, Niles, Irvington, and Warm Springs unified into one city. Each area of the newly incorporated Fremont had its own unique history. Fremont is named after John C. Frémont, a general who helped lead the American Conquest of California from Mexico and later served as Military Governor of California and then a U.S. Senator.

The Quarry where the park is located was in operation from the 1950s through 2007. The gravel was used to build parts of San Francisco and Oakland International Airports, highways, and many other projects. Quarrying changed a 190-foot hill into a pit 22 acres across and 320 feet below sea level at the deepest point, making it the lowest human-made elevation in North America.



The East Bay Regional Park District filled the pit with clean fill from Bay Area construction projects. With the assistance of the City of Fremont the depleted quarry was transformed into a beautiful recreational resource. Trails connect the campground to adjacent Coyote Hills and the San Francisco Bay National Wildlife Refuge for hiking, bicycling, picnicking, and viewing of the abundant wildlife.

The rally was an Easy-Host Rally where there weren't a lot of structured events for campers participation. Campers were given time to explore the natural beauty of the area. They still gathered for a few events, so they could get a chance to mingle with other campers by spending time with friends and making new friends. The rally kicked off on Thursday, May 16th, 2024 with a Welcome Happy Hour where campers braved the cold bay winds. On Friday, May 17th, 2024 campers were invited to the lovely home of Shelley and Peter Denyer in Fremont for a Happy Hour and Hamburger BBQ. The Denyer's were wonderful hosts and all of the guests had a great time. In fact they had so much fun they forgot to take pictures. There were a few group hikes around the campground during the rally. The area is very picturesque. On Saturday, May 18th, 2024 there was a Happy Hour followed by a Potluck. Everyone had fun even though the winds were bitter cold. On Sunday, May 19th, 2024 campers had there final Happy Hour.

















Brannan Island Rally
Brannan Island State Recreation Area
Rio Vista, California
June 7th-10th, 2024

Brannan Island is a small island in the Sacramento–San Joaquin River Delta. The island is named after Samuel Brannan, a prominent Mormon, businessman, journalist, and American settler who led a group of Mormons to California in 1846. He rented a ship's long-boat named the Gusanita and sailed across San Francisco Bay and entered the San Joaquin River. He was looking for suitable land on which to establish a community farm.

Brannan is also credited with being the first person to publicize the California Gold Rush and became California's first millionaire. By the end of 1849 Sam Brannan owned one fourth of the land in Sacramento and had a store on the Sacramento waterfront. He also started a resort for the elite at the foot of Mt. Saint Helena, which was called Calistoga and built a railroad for patrons traveling to the resort. Brannan was also a vintner. He amassed a great deal of wealth during his lifetime but died in poverty on May 14, 1889. He lost his wealth due to risky investments with the Mexican government and having to give his wife a large settlement for their divorce. It was interesting doing the research for this article, as I went to Sam Brannan Middle School in Sacramento and never learned about the famous man for whom the school was named.

The area that is now Brannan Island State Recreation Area was once tidal wetlands and broken leveed tracts of land. The park was created by dredging the area, which made it the highest point east of the Sacramento River for approximately 10–25 miles. The state acquired the 336-acres for the Brannan Island State Recreation Area in 1954 and it became a park in 1965. The park is a network of waterways with many islands and marshes that provide habitats for wildlife and recreational opportunities like swimming and boating. The Brannan Island rally was hosted by the Greater Bay Area Air-stream Club. It was a Boondocking Rally where there were no hook ups available. The rally was set up in the Just Camping format where Happy Hours and meals were ad-hoc.






Show your SVAC Pride!

I took several pictures of it and when I got home I scoured the Internet for a pattern. Luckily I found one by Joline Cook and I have shared it with all of you on the next page.

Go in style! Carry your plate, utensils, and napkin in a quilted carrier to the next group function. When you get there, take out your place setting, turn the carrier over and you have a fancy placemat. You will be envied by all!

Fabric

- ½ yard of main outside fabric
- ½ yard of lining fabric
- 3 – 3" (WOF) of lining fabric or another contrasting fabric
- 2 – 14" squares of one of the fabrics above (bring larger squares if you want a larger napkin)
- ½ yard of batting (cotton or a thin polyester)
- 2 – 1 inch buttons or two 1 ¼" pieces of hook & loop fasteners

Directions

1. Layer the batting, main fabric, and lining fabric and machine quilt using cross hatching or your favorite overall pattern
2. Cut the quilted fabric:
 - One 13" x 28" piece (placemat part)
 - One 8" x 10" piece pocket (for utensils & napkin)
3. Bind pocket on two 8" sides and one 10" side, use a 3/8" seam
4. Bind the all sides of the placemat piece, use a 3/8" seam
5. Lay placemat wrong side up, lengthwise

Pocket

1. Fold up, one short edge, 10" and mark fold with removable marker on the right side of the main piece. Make another line ¼" above the first line (away from edge)
2. Lay placemat with right side up
3. Pocket right side down, center pocket's unbound 10" side on second marked line
4. Stitch down 1/8" from the edge of the pocket, make sure it is secure
5. Fold pocket up and iron, stitch both sides of the pocket onto placemat (see picture)

Sections for Utensils

1. Divide the pocket into 4 sections by stitching 4½" from left edge for the napkin pocket. Stitch from the binding to the bottom.
2. Divide the rest of the pocket into three sections for the utensils and stitch as you did for the napkin pocket
3. If you are using hook and loop fasteners, sew them on now by machine or hand stitch later

Finish

1. Fold the 10" part of the placemat (part with utensil holder) up on the marked fold line and stitch on each side.
2. Add buttonholes/buttons or hand stitch hook & loop fasteners

Napkin

1. Place the two 14" square napkin pieces wrong sides together. Stitch together with ¼" around all the edges leaving a 2-3" unstitched section for turning.
2. Iron – no need to hand stitch opening
3. Stitch around 1/8" and ¼" from edge

Pink Flamingos

Have you wondered why so many pink flamingos are displayed at an Airstream Rally. I see them at most of the rallies I attend. Even though the pink flamingo is not part of the

- official Airstream brand they compliment the promotion of the Airstream.

- These cute birds are viewed as a mascot by many Airstream owners. They symbolize fun, whimsy, quirkiness and a love of the great outdoors. There is an urban legend that the number of pink flamingos you display, equates to how many cocktails you consumed.

The use of plastic pink flamingos as lawn ornaments began in 1957, when the sculpture, Donald Featherstone began making the signed plastic birds, which sold in the Sears Catalog for \$2.76 a pair. The birds came with instructions from Mr. Featherstone to place them in your garden, or on your lawn to

beautify the landscape.” Today they sell for about \$30.00. These plastic birds are the symbol of retro, fun-seeking and are used to welcome the Airstream Community. For his work, Mr. Featherstone was awarded an Ig Nobel Prize, an annual satirical award honoring outré contributions, in 1996. That year he also became the president of Union Products the manufacturer of the plastic pink flamingo lawn ornaments, until his retirement in 2000.

Airstream Recipes



Green Bean and Tomato Salad

Gina Eggers, #3732 submitted this recipe to Airstream.com for an easy and light summer dinner, or side dish. This goes very well with focaccia bread. Gina's Focaccia Bread recipe follows.

(serves 4 as a side, or 2 as a large lunch)

For the salad, boil **4 medium size (or equivalent) Yukon Gold potatoes** with the skin on. Place in a pot of enough salted water to cover the potatoes. Cover and simmer lightly until firm tender, not falling apart. You can cut the potatoes into chunks ahead of time if you want this step to go faster but I think it makes the potatoes more watery. Scoop potatoes from the water (don't drain the water) so they can cool. Throw in a **couple of large handfuls of green beans** (uncut and untrimmed) and simmer in the potato water for about 5 minutes. As with the potatoes, they absorb less water inside if they aren't cut first. They should be still crisp but not hard. Drain and cool.

Whisk 1 1/2 tablespoons of white wine vinegar (or apple cider vinegar) and the juice of half a lemon with 3 tablespoons of olive oil in a bowl. Chop your green beans into bite-size pieces and cut off the stem end. Add to the bowl and toss. Cut some (how many is up to you) cherry tomatoes (multi-colored ones look nice) in half, or any larger tomatoes into bite size chunks. Put in the bowl with the oil and vinegar and toss lightly. Peel the cooled potatoes with your fingers. The skin should rub off easily. Cut out any bad spots or large eyes. Cut the potatoes into bite-size chunks (like for potato salad) and add to bowl. Add a couple of chopped scallions and some chopped parsley and basil. Add salt and pepper and mix lightly. Feta cheese works well in here too, if you want to add that. There are no real measurements, just toss everything in a bowl and taste. You can always add more vinegar or olive oil or tomatoes or scallions. Herbs make the salad look lovely and gives it a bright, fresh flavor. The beauty of this salad is not only in the colors, but in the options you have.

You can change the vegetables or herbs, snap peas or dill come to mind. You can easily increase the amounts for a large Airstream Rally salad to share!

Focaccia a la Airstream

In the largest bowl you have, mix 2 ½ cups flour (all-purpose, bread flour, wheat flour, or a mixture of all 3), 1 tsp of instant yeast (about ½ of a packet of yeast), 3 Tablespoons of olive oil, and one cup of water. Mix with a wooden spoon or your hands until combined. Add 1 tsp of salt. Do not use iodized salt in bread – the iodine interferes with the yeast. Sea salt is my go-to. Mix/knead until the dough is smooth, silky, stretchy and smells lovely. This will take at least 10 minutes. If you would like to know how to knead, there are many videos on YouTube. I am assuming most of you do not have a stand mixer in your Airstream, but if you have one at home you can use that. The dough should be tacky, slightly sticky, but not so sticky that you can't manage it. The flour absorbs the water slowly and with kneading (and time) the dough will be less sticky. If you err on the side of too dry or too sticky, too sticky is better. I use a little olive oil on my hands and the counter to keep it from sticking while kneading. Try to avoid using

more flour unless you have a sticky mess. All flour is different, and you may use more or less each time you make it. Weather is also a factor in keeping it from sticking while kneading.

Put the dough back in the bowl and cover. Go out for a bike ride and come back in an hour. Scoop out the dough with your hands or a bowl scraper (indispensable in my opinion) and stretch and fold back on itself a couple of times. Put back in the bowl and cover. Let rise until about double. Remember that hot weather will speed up the reaction and cold weather will slow it down. Rising can vary from 30 minutes to 2 hours.

After the 2nd rise, pour olive oil in the bottom of the sheet pan and cover generously. Remove the dough and place it on the sheet pan. Using your fingertips, pat and stretch (be gentle!) until the dough fills the pan. Do not be too aggressive with the dough, it doesn't like it. Try not to tear holes in it. A gentle stretch takes time, the gluten wants to retract, so patience is needed. If it's too obstinate, let it rest for 5 minutes. Cover the dough with about $\frac{1}{4}$ cup of olive oil. Spread around using your hands, then dimple the dough all over with your fingertips. Add your toppings, but go lightly. Too much weight will prevent the dough from rising. A good first try is halved cherry tomatoes layered over the olive oil then dotted all over with pesto. Cover with plastic wrap or a damp towel and let rest while you preheat your oven to 450 degrees. When doubled or risen to just under the edge of the pan, remove the plastic wrap. If the dough has absorbed all the olive oil, add more and place in the oven. Putting it on a pizza stone or on top another cookie sheet may keep it from burning on the bottom. Bake 5-10 minutes, then rotate. Bake until golden.




