September Maintenance Moment

Managing Your Girard Tankless Water Heater

After 2.5 seasons, 3 trips to my "local" dealer, 2 calls to Girard, countless You Tube videos, one mobile tech, a new freeze sensor, and a trip to Jackson Center, I was about to throw in the towel and buy a Truma. But determined not to be defeated by a machine, I made a last attempt at research and I FINALLY figured out how to get consistent hot water - not hot, then freezing, then warm, not scalding and then shutting off, but a real shower with consistent hot water AND hot water in the kitchen sink (which was also an issue). If this sounds familiar, here is the adjustment you need.

On the back of your water heater (mine is under the bathroom sink), there is a flow adjustment knob. It is labeled Max/Min but it is the only knob back there so you can't miss it. If this is not adjusted properly, your water heater will not be consistent. Here's why:

Your water heater works on flow. It's a common misconception that it is driven by water pressure. Pressure and flow are different. The rate at which water flows over the heating elements determines its ability to maintain a consistent temperature. If water crosses the heating element too fast, it will get to temperature quickly, but once you use the first gallon or so, it will not stay hot because the water isn't spending enough time on the heating element. This is why it starts hot and just about when you get the shampoo on your head, it turns ice cold. Conversely, if the water spends too much time on the heating element, it will overheat. If you've ever had your water temperature shoot up to 145 and shut off the heater, displaying an E3 code, this is very likely what's happening. (E3 can also be a propane issue if this doesn't solve it). Here's how to fix it:

Set the hot water temperature where you want it in the shower. Mine is set at 108 degrees. Find that knob on the back of your water heater and turn it all the way to the right (the lowest flow possible). This is easiest to do if you can reach your shower wand while you're doing this, but if you can't, get a friend to help. Turn the hot water on in your shower. It doesn't actually have to get hot (you don't have to wait), you just need the water coming from the hot side. While you feel the pressure of the water in the shower, slowly turn the flow adjustment knob to the left (increasing the flow). You should begin to feel the water pressure in the shower STOPS increasing then back off the flow adjustment just a bit (back to the right). This should fix the temperature issues in your shower and allow for consistent hot water. This also allowed me to use either the water pump OR city water equally effectively WITHOUT using both, although both will give you a bit more water pressure.

If you are struggling with no hot water in your kitchen sink, pull out your sprayer and see if your flow increases, and the water turns hot. If it does, you likely have a kink in the sprayer line where the attached weight hits the shelf under your sink. Rearranging where the weight falls should fix this.

If the difference between pressure and flow is confusing, get your garden hose out without a nozzle and try to rinse a window 3 feet in front of you. You can't. You're at full flow but you have low pressure. Now put your thumb over the end to get the spray to reach the window. Viola! You have increased the pressure with the same flow. Pressure and flow are not the same.

I hope to see lots of you in York!

From Glacier we motored south to Wyoming and Yellowstone, the granddaddy of national parks. We had arranged to stay at the Fishing Bridge RV Park on the eastern side of the park. It's run by Xanterra so you don't get the 50% discount, but you do get spacious newly renovated full hook-up sites with easy access to food/gas/merch and the southern loop road. The southern loop has Lake Yellowstone Lodge and its iconic Yellow Car. Then swings by Old Faithful Lodge and its namesake geyser (which performed right on time for us!). You can mosey along and catch up to a few buffalo herds – and lots of tourists taking their pictures...





There are hot springs, steaming pools, sulphur springs, bubbling mud pots and quiet views of the park all along the loop.











A section of the southern loop parallels the Grand Canyon of Yellowstone, another of the treasures of the park. The views are magnificent, and the hearty can hike to both falls along the Yellowstone River.









Or quietly fish for trout along the river's path.

The northern loop is more rugged and somewhat less traveled. We followed it through beautiful panoramas, taking a quaint rest stop at Roosevelt Lodge before heading on to Mammoth Springs.

Before leaving Yellowstone we drove north out of the park on the Beartooth Highway, dubbed 'the most beautiful road in America'. At \sim 10,000 ft along the drive there's the Top of the World Store, a quaint shop for gas, groceries and cabins for hikers or snow mobile riders in the winter.









We took US 14 east out of Yellowstone, passing through Cody (and the Buffalo Bill Center of the West) and stopped at Little Big Horn, site of Custer's Last Stand (and now also a national cemetery).





Making a left turn we headed north to the Dakotas to visit Theodore Roosevelt National Park. The northern section, near Epping ND, was very interesting with scenic overlooks and unique formations of round rock-balls that fall from the cliffs.

The southern section, near Medora ND is more expansive and it's easy to see how Teddy fell in love with this part of the country. And here we noted smart buffalo who made their own paths along the park roads rather than on them...









Medora is an interesting town in itself. It's not large but boasts a storied history of the west and is host to the Medora Musical, now in its 60th consecutive year of production. A fun evening outing.



From Medora we headed south to the Black Hills of South Dakota, stopping at Devil's Tower, Mount Rushmore and taking a scenic drive on the Needles Highway.







Moving east we didn't have the greatest weather so the colors at Badlands National Park were muted, but the countryside still fascinating.

Driving out of the Badlands we spotted the Minuteman Missile National Historic Site. It's a fascinating museum complete with a film highlighting how many of us did the 'duck and cover' under our desks in grade school!





From here we headed steadily home but found very nice overnights at a cute little city campground in Montrose, SD; a nice Army Corps park (Tailwater) along Coralville Lake in Iowa City, IA; and a friendly KOA along I-70 in Belle Vernon, PA.





We had a great adventure. 9 weeks with good weather, about 8,200 miles and only a few surprises. But it is nice to be back and not counting down road signs!
