Should I Volunteer to Host or Co-host a 2026 Rally??

Have you ever thought about volunteering to Host or Co-host a Rally? With the OAC 2026 Rally planning and reservations well underway, now may be the time to "take the leap"!! It's easy, fun, and fulfilling.

To help you understand "What's Involved" an outline of Key Duties and Responsibilities is provided below.

To further inform Rally Hosts and Co-hosts, every year there is a Rally Host/Co-host On-line Training Session provided by the OAC Rally Coordinator.

Finally, any required help or guidance needed by a Rally Host or Co-host is always just a phone call away to your Rally Coordinator or another OAC Board Member.

Rally Host and Co-Host Basic Overview

- Hosting a Rally Typically Involves:
 - Overall Rally Planning and Coordination
 - Organization of a Rally Plan/Schedule
 - Communication of the Rally Plan/Schedule to Campers
- Co-Hosting a Rally typically involves:
 - Learning Under Mentorship of a more experienced Rally Host
 - Learning by Doing (in coordination with the Rally Host)

Detailed Rally Host Duties and Responsibilities (with Co-host Participation)

- Manage the Rally Logistics and Communications:
 - Develop an Overall Rally Plan, including:
 - Group Activities and Timing
 - Ample Free Time
 - Email Campers Regarding Your Rally (Early and Often)
 - Suggest Local Area Attractions and Recreational Opportunities
 - Plan Special Group Activities (Hikes, Bike Rides, Fishing, Etc.)
- Stay in Touch with your Rally Coordinator:
 - General Status of Your Rally
 - Reservation Adjustments
 - Reservation Questions
 - General Guidance
- Document Your Rally for the OAC Newsletter:
 - Take Pictures of Your Rally Location and Group
 - Write a Couple of Paragraphs About Your Rally Highlights
 - Send Both to the OAC Newsletter Chair
- Develop and Communicate Any Rally Meal Plans:
 - Potluck Meals
 - Catered Meals (Check with Park)
 - Host Provided Meals (Completely Optional)
 - Hybrid Host Entrée with Camper Potluck Sides
 - Group Restaurant Reservations
 - Other Creative Options...

THE MOST IMPORTANT RESPONSIBILITY OF RALLY HOSTS AND CO-HOSTS IS TO HAVE FUN AND ENJOY YOUR RALLY WITH YOUR CAMPERS!!

Caravans - Adventures That Could Fit Your Lifestyle

If you’ve ever thought about joining an Airstream Caravan but hesitated because of time, logistics, or uncertainty—this is your nudge.

Caravans aren’t just long-haul commitments. Sure, some stretch two weeks or more and offer deep immersion into landscapes, history, and community. But shorter Caravans—weekend jaunts or 5-day escapes—can be just as rewarding. They’re easier to fit into busy schedules and still deliver the camaraderie, shared meals, and roadside stories that make Airstream life special.

And if none of our scheduled options quite fit? You’re not stuck. Your Caravan Coordinator can help you build your own. Whether it’s a small group of friends heading to a state park or a themed trip tied to local history, you’ve got support to make it happen.

Bottom line: Caravans are flexible. They're about connection, not complication. So, take a look. Try a short one. Or start sketching your own. You might be surprised how easy it is to turn "someday" into "next month."

Airstream-Specific Maintenance Suggestions: Tires, Bearings & Brakes

With all the miles you are accumulating during this busy time of year, it might be wise to review some maintenance items.

Tires: Built for the Road, But Not Forever

Replace every 5–7 years, regardless of tread—UV and ozone degrade sidewalls.

Cold pressure check before every tow. Most Airstreams run ST225/75R15 or ST235/80R16 tires—verify PSI from your placard (often 65–80 PSI).

Torque lug nuts to 100–120 ft-lbs. Recheck after 10-, 25-, and 50-miles post-install.

Watch for uneven wear—could signal axle misalignment or suspension issues.

Bearings: Dexter EZ-Lube Axles Make It Easier

Annual inspection or every 10,000–12,000 miles.

Most Airstreams use Dexter EZ-Lube axles, allowing grease injection via zerk fittings behind the dust cap.

Still inspect manually every other year: pull hubs, clean bearings, check races, and repack if needed.

Use **high-temp, water-resistant grease** (like Lucas X-tra Heavy Duty or Red N Tacky).

Brakes: Know Your Nev-R-Adjust System

Most late-model Airstreams use **Dexter Nev-R-Adjust electric drum brakes**:

Self-adjusting—no manual star wheel is needed unless initial setup is off.

Inspect annually for wear, magnet condition, and wiring integrity.

Brake controller gain should be tested before each trip. Start around 6.0 and adjust based on trailer weight and responsiveness.

Brake shoe life: Typically, 20,000–30,000 miles, but dusty or wet conditions can shorten that.

Manual override test: Use your tow vehicle's brake controller to confirm trailer brakes engage smoothly.

If you have any reservations about performing any maintenance, please consult a qualified expert.

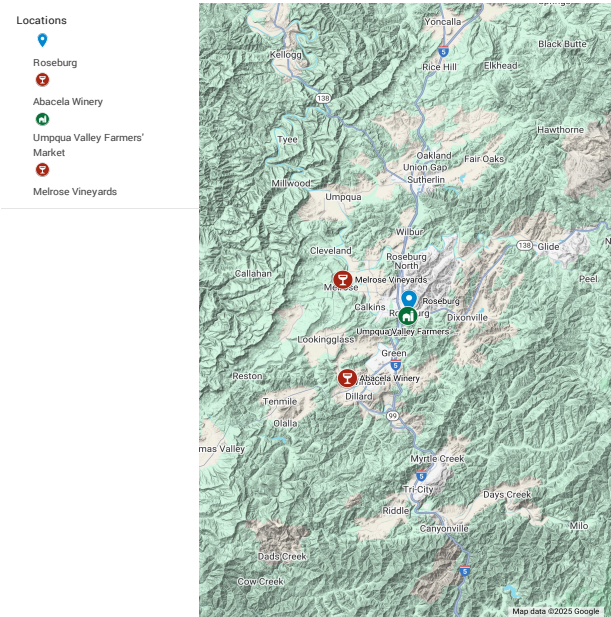

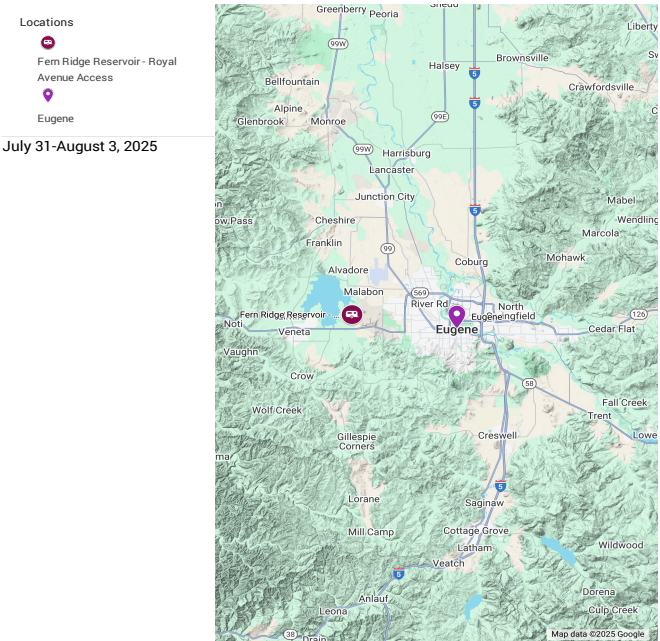
