


### 1st Vice President's Report



## **We Rally Together**

Airstreamers Returned to Cadillac and Made a Difference by Pegeen Smith BRN #8039

The 2nd Annual Airstreams Return to Cadillac rally hosted 28 rigs (up from 19 rigs in 2025) on July 17-20, 2025 in Cadillac, MI. As one of the hosts, I want to thank my co-hosts for everything they did to make this event a success. Lovely shared breakfasts and dinners, bike rides and walks around the property and nightly campfires made for a perfect rally. But the big highlight was our annual service project(s).



Veterans Serving Veteran, Inc. (VSV) **collected \$4050.00** in donated camping fees including a generous donation from Mercantile Bank.

That money was used to pay for all of the materials for our various service projects. Here is what we accomplished:

- Two teams installed **270 feet split rail fence** (almost a football field!)
- 4 man crew sunk 30-8 foot X 4 inch, parking lot posts
- Crew of volunteers painted 139 names on etched donor boards
- The gardening group planted and mulched 60 perennial flowers after prepping the bed by removing concrete flash and rocks, adding in a mixture of top soil and compost. They spread 20 yards the surrounding area with starter fertilizer and top soil
- Another crew of volunteers moved **20 picnic tables** under the pavilion
- More attendees unloaded the MAC shell, set up and priced items for the rummage sale.
   Thousands of dollars of items were donated to VSV, made \$411.00 in sales (mostly from fellow Airstreamers) and donated the remaining items to the Habitat for Humanity ReStore in Cadillac
- Estimated 300 volunteer man hours accomplished all in ONE DAY!





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All the above doesn't even count the endless generosity of those who volunteered to help with meals, clean up, garbage disposal, transporting rummage sale items to Habitat, can donations, fire pit management, musical entertainment, etc. etc. Also, a big thank you to SkyMed for sponsoring our Friday morning breakfast.

We are humbled by the generosity of all of you and wish to celebrate everything you have done to make this rally a success.

Dr. Roger Bandeen would like to extend his heartfelt thank you to everyone who attended the rally and volunteered their time and talent. He is already thinking about new projects for next year!

Speaking of next year, mark your calendars! 2026 marks the 60th anniversary of the 9th Airstream Club International Rally that happened in Cadillac, Michigan not too far from the Veterans Serving



Veterans Park. While we don't expect to have 2727 rigs like they did in 1966, we hope to have you join us to celebrate this historic event. Airstreams Return to Cadillac III, 60th Anniversary celebration is scheduled for July 15 - 19, 2026. You won't want to miss it.

## Pumpkin Risotto with Crispy Sage

From the Kitchen of Karen Fisher

Prep: 15 minutes Cook: 45 minutes

Description: This creamy pumpkin risotto recipe with crispy sage is laced with warm spice to accentuate the winter squash and is aromatic with savory garlic and herbs. Butter, half and half, and Parmesan make it decadent while white wine cuts through the richness. It's a lovely addition to a holiday spread, but also the perfect cozy side dish during cold weather months.

### Ingredients:

- 1 Thsp salted butter
- 8 leaves fresh sage
- 2 1/4 cups chicken or vegetable stock
- 1 Tbsp olive oil
- 1/2 cup diced onion
- 2 tsp minced garlic
- 1/5 Tosp minced fresh thyme
- $\ensuremath{\psi_{\!\!4}}$  cup dry white wind such as Sauvignon Blane or Pinot Grigio
- 1/2 cup canned pumpkin puree
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1 pinch black pepper
- 1/4 cup fat free half and half creamer
- 1 1/2 oz freshly grated Parmesan cheese

- Crispy Sage: Add the butter to a large skillet over medium heat. Once melted, add the sage leaves and cook until crispy, about 30 seconds to 1 minute per side. Transfer to a paper towel lined plate.
- Pumpkin Risotto: Add the stock to a medium-large saucepan. Bring to a gentle simmer over low heat and keep the broth warm throughout the entire cooking.
- 3. Add the oil to a large saucepan over medium heat. Add the onion and cook for 3 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add the gartic and thyme and cook for 30 seconds, stirring constantly. Stir in the rice and coo for 1 ½ minutes, stirring frequently, to toast the rice. Stir in the wine and use a wooden spoon to scrape any brown bits up to the properties of the stirring frequently cooking until the wine has evaporated, about 1 minute. Stir in the pumpkin puree, salt, black pepper, and about ½ cup of war stock. Turn the heat down to low.
- 4. Continue adding about ½ to ½ cup of warm stock as the rice absorbs the liquid, while stirring occasionally (but stirring much more frequently towards the end of the cooking process). It takes about 30 minutes for the rice to cook and absorb all the stock.
- Once the stock is absorbed, stir in the half and half until creamy, about 3 to 5 minutes, stirring constantly.
- 6. Remove from the heat. Stir in the nutureg and 1 ounce of grated Parmesan cheese.
- Transfer the risotto to a serving dish. Serve garnished with the remaining Parmesan cheese and the crispy sage.

Reheating: You can reheat risotto either on the stove top or in the microwave, but you'll need to add around ¼ cup of liquid per 1 cup of cold risotto. And just like when you first made it. Be sure to stir frequently when you reheat risotto.

### Crockpot Chicken & Dumplings

### Ingredients

12 oz uncooked skinless, boneless, chicken breast

1 can condensed cream of celery soup (or cream of chicken)

1 tsp poultry seasoning

- 1 tsp dried thyme
- 1 tsp dried parsley
- 1 cup fat free chicken broth
- 1 package (10 oz) frozen peas and carrots, thawed

Pillsbury Grands! Jr Golden Layers Buttermilk Biscuits (package of 5)

1 Tosp fresh parsley

- In bottom of crockpot, place onions. Add whole chicken breast. In small bowl, mix soup, poultry season, thyme, and dried parsley. Pour over chicken. Add chicken broth. Cook on low for 6-8 hours or high for
- Approximately 90 minutes prior to serving. Remove chicken breast and shred. Return to crockpot. Add peas and carrots. Mix well. Roll each

biscuit flat and cut into short strips. Lay strips on top of chicken mixture. Cover and cook for remaining 90 minutes.

3. Prior to serving, stir gently, breaking up biscuits. Sprinkle with fresh parsley and serve.

- When serving larger quantities, I use both cream of celery and cream of
- 2. This can be made in an electric roaster for large groups. Use 300-325 degrees F (equivalent to high on a crockpot). I also allow longer time to cook just to make sure it is ready when needed. I can always turn it down if ready early.



### Keweenaw Sites by Laurie McLean, BRN #5792

In August and September Earl and I usually take a trip to the Upper Peninsula to escape the heat in Detroit and enjoy cooler weather. For a number of years, we have particularly enjoyed our trips to the Keweenaw Peninsula, just south of Copper Harbor. This year we took two copper mine tours. Two different mines, with two different stories.

The Delaware Mine, about 8 miles south of Copper Harbor, was started in 1846. It operated over the next 40 years and produced a little over seven million pounds of copper. Mine workers, managers, and their families lived on site in a small community that included homes, a school, church, and company store. Copper, mined from the volcanic rock on 10 mining levels, was shipped out through Eagle Harbor on Lake Superior. By 1886, the mining company and investors spent over four million dollars extracting the copper. The mine went bankrupt eight times and never made a profit.



Tillie wasn't sure she wanted to go down. But after being left behind by me and Jasmine, she worked her way carefully down the dark steps.

We enjoyed our self-guided tour walking along the first level after descending 100 damp dark steps from the surface. The mine is tidied up but is generally in its original condition.

Lower levels, which you can see down old shafts at the sides of the first level, are flooded because after the mine closed water kept seeping in and wasn't pumped out.



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The Quincy Mine National Historic Park is located in Hancock, MI, just north of Houghton. There is a large visitor center, museum and a great undergraduate geology major from Michigan Tech as a lively tour guide. We visited the museum and watched a detailed demonstration of how the world's

largest steam-driven mine hoist carried copper ore and mine workers through the 9,260-foot shaft at up to 36 miles an hour. Then, we were guided through an access shaft set up as an exhibit to simulate the mining experience.

"Old Reliable", as it was known, was highly profitable while in operation for over 50 years, but the Great Depression took its toll on profits. Technology advanced to where skilled workers were no longer needed. After WWII the government stopped subsidies and the mine closed. Large pit mines in the west, mining copper along with other metals became more viable.

Copper from the Keweenaw Peninsula supported the Industrial Revolution and a vibrant local economy. After it fell, the economy never recovered. But now, based on tourism of its rugged natural beauty, it's still a favorite place to appreciate and visit.

An 800 lb. pure copper boulder. It was more work to break it apart to bring it to the surface than it was worth. The copper metal is soft and doesn't break apart easily. So, the mine company instructed miners to leave them behind. Small copper pieces separated from basalt by stamping were more profitable.
