Airstream misadventure #11

When planning a road trip, we like to scope out potential gas stations. There's nothing worse than running on fumes and the only gas station for miles around is just too darn small for your rig. Google Maps is great for this; the satellite view lets you zoom right in and look at the layout of the pumps. The best stations align the pumps so that you can drive straight through without having to turn. Stations that "will do in a pinch" force you to turn but have a nice big space around the pumps. 2025 Nova Scotia 70th Anniversary ACI Rally Recap

On the weekend after Labour Day, John and I attended an Airstream rally in Nova Scotia. This four-day event was hosted by Region 1 to celebrate the 70th anniversary of the founding of the Wally Byam Airstream Club (now known as Airstream Club International).

On our way east from the Kingston Rendezvous, we stopped for three nights at Montreal, five nights at Quebec City, three nights at Grand Falls, NB, and three nights at St. Andrews, NB. There, we caught up with fellow Ontario club members Jeannie and Kim E. and Melanie and Murray C. Together we had a delightful visit with John and Susan K. at their new home. Excitement built over the next four days, as

we made our way towards the Annapolis Valley in Nova Scotia. We saw ever-increasing numbers of Airstreams on the highways and in campgrounds.

The rally site, which was a small fairground in Lawrencetown, was jam packed with 140 Airstreams of all sizes and vintages, squeezed cozily together like an aluminum Tetris puzzle. Roughly one third were Canadian and two thirds American, and everybody was super friendly. The rally hosts were from Quebec, and they did a wonderful job of putting on a party with regional flair.



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Highlights of the 70th Anniversary ACI Rally:

- 1. Catching up with old friends we met during previous rallies and caravans was wonderful. Isn't it amazing how we Airstreamers form such enduring bonds? Rally organizers did a good job of making our American friends feel especially welcome, and there was a solid sense of international camaraderie all weekend.
- 2. Visiting the site in Kentville to see The Plaque that was erected in 2005, marking the 50th anniversary of the first meeting of the Wally Byam Caravan Club, was very moving. Having Dale (Peewee)
 Schwamborn there, to reminisce about being there in 1955, was icing on the cake. Dale also gave two fascinating slide presentations at the rally about his mother Helen Byam Schwamborn (Wally's cousin) and about Wally Byam himself.





3. Sailing on Bluenose II on a sunny, breezy day, out of Lunenburg harbour was totally thrilling and a huge privilege. She hoisted four sails and heeled over nicely. Bluenose II was built in 1963, rebuilt in 2012, and is an exact replica of the original Bluenose (a wooden-hulled commercial fishing schooner built in 1921). For the next 17 consecutive years Bluenose won the annual International Fishermen's Trophy which made her the fastest sailing ship in the world. In 1938 she was named Oueen of the North Atlantic Fishing Fleet. Bluenose has been pictured on the Canadian dime since 1937.

4. Finally, the team of volunteers who organized the rally were amazing. When we arrived at the fairgrounds, someone in an eight-foot-tall blow-up red lobster costume waved us in. The food at the rally was delicious and most of it was prepared by the cooking team. Meals included fish and chips (from a chip truck), a pork tenderloin BBQ with all the trimmings, a home-style seafood chowder dinner, and a full hot breakfast on the final day.

After the rally wrapped up, we reluctantly said 'until we meet again' farewells to friends from distant places and, over the course of four days, made a beeline for Lombardy to meet up with more Airstream friends at our fall gathering.

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Labrador Adventure 2026

Interested in a cutting edge adventure? OCAC caravan to Labrador is in the works.

The inland passage from Quebec to
Labrador is a rugged challenge including
pristine, undeveloped northern lands. Our
intent is to follow the gorgeous north shore
of the St Lawrence to Baie Comeau and
then head inland through Quebec with
stops including an Innu based station,
Churchill Falls and other massive hydro
electric facilities, locations highlighting the
indigenous culture as well as early
European and modern influences. Once
along the Atlantic coast we plan a stay at a
living museum as well as visiting historic

and cultural sites reflecting the life of Labrador people over the past 400 years.

This early season will mean cooler, but do not expect freezing weather. Some tourism sites will not be open yet so we will focus on the land and people around us.

Overnight stays will include community parking lots - and an abandoned air strip!

Some sections - various reports suggest about 100 km split in 2 sections - are unpaved and rough. Long stretches of uninhabited land so you and your trailer/ vehicle need to be stocked up, fuelled up (some travel with spare fuel containers), with spare tires and other maintenance equipment on hand. Wildlife in abundance.



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Most importantly, this time of year will be just prior to the black fly and mosquito season. We hope.


The caravan end location will let you decide whether to explore the Labrador coast further on your own - dip down into coastal Quebec, cross into Newfoundland on the ferry, or return inland and take in tourist attractions that will have opened.

What fuel does your silver spaceship run on?

In the Star Trek series, the Enterprise, or NC-1701, used dilithium crystals to regulate the matter—antimatter reaction in the warp drives. I can hear Scotty now saying, "I canny do it Captain, we need more dilithium crystals!".

We do not run on the fictional dilithium crystals, but we do run our silver spaceships on electrons produced by shore power hookups or from out onboard batteries. The closest we get to the fictional dilithium crystals is the power produced from lithium batteries. It is well established that lithium batteries have more usable energy than lead acid or AGM batteries for the same amp hour size battery, thereby allowing you to go without power hookups longer. I recently changed my batteries from the AGMs that came with the Airstream to lithium batteries. This was a planned upgrade as I had changed out the converter last year to a lithium compatible one when the original equipment converter one failed. We found that we were doing more boondocking nights on our travels taking advantage of our Harvest Host membership and the old AGM batteries were not giving us the comfort level we wanted. This year, we made the decision to replace the AMG batteries with lithium ones.

Looking at all the lithium batteries on the market, the things I wanted were good quality and ones with Canadian content.

Since almost all lithium batters are made in Asia, I was looking for a Canadian company that engineered lithium batteries and understood the Canadian climate and market. I was quite pleased when I found Volthium a Canadian company out of Quebec that did all the engineering and designing of lithium batteries for the Canadian market. You can read more about them and their products at www.volthium.com. I bought two of their 12 Volt 130-amp hour, self-heating batteries and installed them in my Airstream. In the month since I installed the lithium batteries from Volthium we have boondocked for six nights and four of those nights were sequential, with a much higher confidence level in the comfort level we wanted, especially when it came to keeping us warm at night.

After installing the lithium batteries, we set out on a six-week tour and part of our tour was to take us past the Volthium facilities just outside Montreal, so I contacted them by email to see if we could get a tour of their facilities. The people at Volthium were very happy to give us a tour, so we were set up to tour their facilities four days after our trip began.

While there, the people at Volthium showed us a new lithium battery they are just about to bring out to the market and for those of you without solar panels on the roof you might be very interested in this one. It is a group 27 battery; the group number just refers to the physical dimensions of the battery and quite often the batteries that come with the Airstream are group 27. This is a 12 V DC, 100-amp hour battery that is self-heated with a battery management system (BMS) that protects against cold charging and high temperatures, overload and undervoltage as well as short circuit protection. The battery comes with an on-off switch so you can switch off the battery for storage and can be connected to a Victron display system. The batteries are also resistant to vibration which makes them great for RV use.





What makes this battery stand out is the fact that you do not need a \$500 DC to DC charger, extra wiring and connection to your tow vehicle so that the battery can be charged while driving down the road to your next campsite. This battery can be charged from the power supplied by your 7-way connector with the addition of a \$130 black box that connects directly to the battery, so no need for an extra connection between the tow vehicle and Airstream. While at Volthium they offered to switch out the 130 amp hour batteries I had for the new and not yet on the market but since I have solar and the best solar charging usually takes place while driving down the road, I opted to keep the batteries I had. Here is a link to the batteries I bought and if you have solar they may work for you: 12V 130Ah selfheating battery - Volthium.

The new batteries are on the market now, Volthium batteries come with a 10-year warranty, and they told me that the batteries should last 15 years and for me that most likely means the last batteries I buy for the Airstream. So, who needs

dilithium crystals when you have Volthium batteries on board.

Speaking of batteries on board, if you own a Classic with the Alde system installed there are two AA batteries that maintain the memory when disconnected from the main batteries. I have not found any reference to these AA batteries in the owner's manual, but you should check and replace as required. To remove the face place of the Alde control panel just pry from the bottom and lift up, then there will be four screws holding on the panel, remove them and lift the panel out of the wall and you will see the two AA batteries connected to a wire from the back of the unit. When replacing the screws on the control panel do not overtighten as it will break the plastic tabs on the controller body.
