Notes from Your OAC Rally Coordinator

As I am writing this article, the 2025 camping season is quickly coming to an end. Once the Annual Friendsgiving Rally is complete, the 2025 camping season will be "in the books". This has truly been a phenomenal year with many memories created, new friends gained, and lots of miles successfully and safely "under the wheels".

This has also been a year of positive change with the Rally Coordinator role being modified to become the leader of a five-person Rally Committee. This new organization has the Rally Coordinator assisted by four Rally Managers.

Once an overall Rally Plan is in place, each Rally Manager is responsible to plan, reserve, and manage approximately ten assigned Rallies for the coming year. The Rally Managers serve a nominal two-year term since Rallies are often reserved a year or more in advance and then, each Rally Manager manages each of their assigned Rallies during the coming camping season until they are all complete. The Rally Managers are assisted and mentored by the Rally Coordinator who maintains over-all responsibility for all Rallies and mentors the Rally Managers to assure a consistent approach for all OAC Rally activities.

This new Rally Committee organization has been working well, the 2026 Rally Plan is in place, and most Rally sites have been reserved for the 2026 camping season. A few Rally Hosts are still needed. A list of the 2026 Rallies still needing Hosts was recently sent as an All-Member email. The response has been good with several volunteers stepping forward to Host during 2026. More 2026 Rally Hosts are still needed. Contact me at jaembe123@comcast.net if you are interested.

Preparations for the 2026 OAC Rally Handbook are also well underway. As normal, the plan is to mail the 2026 Rally Handbook to all current members of the OAC before the end of the year. Once complete, the Rally Handbook will also be available on the OAC website.

2026 OAC Rally Registrations will be held during mid-January. All OAC members will receive an email, well prior to the registration date, which will contain all necessary details regarding the 2026 OAC Rally Registration schedule and process. We will continue to use a three day registration process with Hosts registering for their own Rallies (Day 1), Hosts registering for their "Thank You" Rally, one for each Rally Hosted, (Day 2), and General OAC Member/Affiliate Registration (Day 3).

Finally, believe it or not, planning for the 2027 Rally season will begin shortly with Jennifer Neumann in the position of 2027 Rally Coordinator working with her team of four Rally Managers. I will continue as the 2026 Rally Coordinator and will be available to assist Jennifer in any way needed as she and her team prepare for the 2027 camping season.

Airstream – The early years

Wally Byam, born in 1896 in Oregon, grew up living in a donkey-pulled wooden wagon on a sheep farm—an experience that planted the seed for mobile living.

In 1929, to make camping more enjoyable for his wife, he built a tent on a Model T chassis.

This early rig was a simple tent frame and fabric stretched over a shortened automobile chassis, more like a portable shelter than a factory trailer. Google provided the image below. It was clunky and impractical, so he replaced it with a **teardrop-shaped permanent shelter** featuring a stove and ice chest. It was called the Torpedo (shown below)and drew attention from fellow travelers, prompting Wally to publish DIY plans and eventually build trailers for sale. Pendleton Roundup (ACI National Rally) – September

59 Years of Tradition: Airstreamers at the Pendleton Round-Up



For nearly six decades, Airstreamers have rolled into Pendleton, Oregon every September to take part in one of the West's most historic celebrations: the Pendleton Round-Up. This year marked the 59th consecutive rally alongside the Round-Up, continuing a tradition that began in the 1960s and has since become one of the longest-running Airstream gatherings in the country.

The Pendleton Round-Up itself, first held in 1910, is one of

America's premier rodeos
— famous for its grass
infield arena, unique
pageantry, and the

timeless motto: "Let 'er Buck!". Pairing this iconic event with the fellowship of Airstream life has created something truly special: a rally that blends history, western heritage, and our enduring spirit of community.

Rally Highlights

Monday – The Rally Begins

Members gathered at the Chuck Wagon (our central gazebo) for a welcome Meet & Greet. Old friends reconnected, new faces were welcomed, and the evening concluded with a hearty fajita dinner to set the tone for the week. This year's rally drew Airstreamers from across the country, as far east as New Hampshire and as far south as Arizona, a true testament to the draw and legacy of Pendleton.



Tuesday – Royalty & History

Breakfast at Roosters Country Kitchen was especially memorable this year, as attendees were joined not only by local royalty but also by national ambassadors. Present were the 2025 Happy Canyon Princesses, Avery Quaempts (Hánnit wa tumult — "Generous Heart," Cayuse) and Korie Spencer; the Pendleton Round-Up Queen & Court: Queen Sydney Dodge with Princesses Alexis Bowen, Rowdy Israel, Myranda Spicknall, and Lexi Thompson; Miss Rodeo America 2025, Callie Mueller, who serves as the official spokesperson for American professional rodeo; and Miss Rodeo Canada 2025, Codi Wilson of Alberta, a fourth-generation cowgirl dedicated to celebrating and preserving western tradition. These distinguished women each contribute their leadership, grace, and commitment to rodeo culture, enhancing the sense of heritage and inspiration we experienced throughout the day.

The day continued with a backstage tour of the Pendleton Round-Up Arena, built in 1910 and famed for its



one-of-a-kind grass infield. Generations of cowboys, Native American performers, and rodeo fans have filled these stands. In the afternoon, attendees explored Pendleton's colorful past on the Pendleton Underground Tour, where guides shared stories of hidden tunnels, Chinese immigrant history, prohibitionera saloons, and the city's rougher frontier days. Dinner back at camp capped off a full day of culture and history.

Wednesday - The Round-Up Opens

The rally joined Pendleton in celebrating the official start of the Round-Up. After breakfast, highlighted by a cherished tradition of serving steel-cut oatmeal with ice cream to the Pendleton

Middle School Cross-Country Team in honor of Wally Byam, members cheered the opening Grand Entry and rodeo competitions, immersing themselves in the energy and pageantry of this historic event.

Thursday – Native Heritage & Pageantry

The day began with a guided tour of the Tamástslikt Cultural Institute. This world-class museum honors the Cayuse, Umatilla, and Walla Walla tribes, preserving their history, traditions, and perspective on western expansion.



That evening, Airstreamers attended the Happy Canyon Night Show, an outdoor pageant first staged in 1916. For over a century, it has told the story of the American West, beginning with Native life, through settlement and the Oregon Trail, to the founding of Pendleton. The spectacle remains one of the most cherished traditions of Round-Up week.

Friday – The Parade and More Rodeo

The day began with the Westward Ho! Parade, one of the only non-motorized parades in the country. Horse-drawn wagons, Native American families in full

regalia, rodeo royalty, and cowboys filled the streets of Pendleton, creating a living tapestry of western heritage. The afternoon featured more rodeo action for those with tickets, while the evening brought everyone back together at the Chuck Wagon for dinner and camaraderie.



Saturday – Finals & Farewell Feasts



Saturday was rodeo championship day, with finals in every event and the thrilling (and often hilarious) Wild Cow Milking competition. The rally's raffle drawing generated over \$1,200 in donations to be split between the respective charities of the Pendleton Round-Up Queen and the Happy Canyon Princesses.




The day concluded with a hearty sendoff dinner of beef and chicken chili, sides, and dessert before one last evening under the oak trees.

relaxing and a pleasant end before bed. Must come back.


Joint OR/WA (aka Lovefest Rally) – September

McMinnville Airshow – September

The McMinnville Airshow Rally, September 25-28, was a unique Airstreaming experience for the 27 attendees. Held at the very comfortable Dundee RV Resort (full use of their clubhouse, full hook-ups, plenty of space, and a doggie park, too,) we had 13 rigs from the Portland area, Willamette Valley and as far away as Crescent City and the Bay Area (CA) to the Land Yacht Harbor in Olympia. We shared great pizza and a gourmet's sampling from nearby olive oil producers (dipped in tasty French bread), a movie night under the stars hosted by the resort and plenty of good conversations. But the highlights were the great airshow, the nearby numerous wine offerings and the chance to explore the McMinnville/Dundee/Lafayette communities.

The Oregon International Air Show in McMinnville on Friday and Saturday was truly spectacular with perfect weather and precision performances by many individual pilots and flight teams. Both days were

filled with aerobatic stunts that defied gravity, the laws of physics and our imagination. The demonstrations and walk-around displays featured some of our military's most advanced aerial technology including flyovers by the Oregon Air National Guard's F-15s, a demo flight by the US Navy's F-16s and the EA-18G Growlers team out of Whidbey Island Naval Air Station.

Showcasing how far technology has advanced in 80+ years, some perfectly restored classic planes including a B-25 J Mitchell bomber, a Grumman F-6 Hellcat and a Douglas SBD Dauntless, took to the sky. The crowd was clearly touched as old met new when a beautiful vintage P-38 Mustang performed wingtip to wingtip alongside its modern-day F35 counterpart in the highly anticipated "Heritage Flight".

The show concluded with the world-renowned Canadian Armed Forces Snowbirds flying 9 of their CT-114 Tutor jets in synchronized and complex aerial maneuvers; the sound and the power of these "birds" was impressive.

One of our own club members, Paul Ware from Vancouver, even got to sit next to a retired jet fighter pilot who was "THE" Leader of the F-16's demo team for three years' worth of show tours around the US and in other countries. What a special afternoon of personal commentary and insights he got, along with a personally autographed poster—lucky ticket and memorable for sure.

For anyone who loves the sights, sounds and even the idea of flight, and for Airstreamers looking for a great Fall Rally with plenty to see, sip (Cabernets and Pinots) and explore, this is an event not to be missed.



Recipe: Dinner Rolls

By Lise Driggers



Makes $2 - 2 \frac{1}{2}$ dozen rolls

4 to 4 ½ cup all-purpose flour 1 pkg active dry yeast 1 c milk 1/3 c sugar 1/3 c butter (margarine or shortening) 1 tsp salt 2 eggs

Oven 375F

- In a large mixer bowl, combine 2 cups of the flour and the yeast
- In a saucepan, heat milk, sugar, butter and salt until warm (115F to 120F) and butter mostly melted, stirring constantly
- Add to flour mixture
- Add eggs
- Beat at low speed for ½ minute, scraping sides of bowl constantly
- Beat 3 minutes at high speed
- Stir in as much remaining flour as you can mix with a spoon
- Turn out onto a floured surface
- Knead enough remaining flour to make a moderately stiff dough that is smooth and elastic (6 to 8 minutes total)
- Shape into ball
- Place in greased bowl, turning once
- Cover, let rise in warm place until double (1 hour)
- Punch down
- Divide dough in half, covered
- Let rest 10 minutes
- Shape into desired rolls
- Cover, let rise until double (30 minutes)
- Bake 11 15 minutes or until golden

Thank you for reading and now, on to the next chapter.




Submissions to the OAC Streamer, how to


